CORRESPONDENCE

Fellsmere, Florida

Dear Highway:

We have recently attended a Holiness Camp Meeting at Lakeland, Fla., a very pretty inland city, surrounded by lovely little lakes, which with tropical scenery make it a very desirable place for a religious gathering. The camp is situated about three miles from town, on a nice highway leading to Orlando, where it was formerly held. The brethren recently purchased a large tabernacle and grounds situated in a grove of oak and pine.

They built a large hotel and will another year build a dormitory, with rooms for workers and all who may attend. The ladies took it upon themselves to furnish those rooms and the money was soon raised for building purposes.

There was a good staff of workers. The evangelists were Rev. Joseph Smith and Joseph Owen. The singers were Professor Wells and wife, with a fine orchestra, assisted by some good folk from Georgia, also others from out of town. The Salvation Army with their fine orchestra helped in every way they could. It was very inspiring to hear Commissioner Brengle from New York, and all enjoyed his splendid talks on his early life struggles, and the work of the Army, then in its infancy. He has travelled around the world many times, and is a cultured scholarly man, with a very humble Christ-like spirit. He is resting now from active work, leaving the burden and heat of the day to others.

I had a few minutes' conversation with him—he told me that he had been in Houlton some years ago. His wife passed on about five years ago, and he still feels his loss very keenly; he is now in his 70th year, but is still beloved by his soldiers. The Army is very active in Florida as they can always hold open air meetings in this warm climate.

Brother Joseph Smith held a school of the prophets one hour every morning, which was a very profitable session. His lessons were mostly on the life of Paul, whom he called the great master-builder. The class text was: "Follow Me, and I will make you fishers of men." Class song: *A Charge to Keep I Have*. All were free to ask one question, and many of the young preachers were greatly helped on points of Scripture they did not understand.

Brother Smith preached with great unction and power, much conviction was on the people, and the altars were full at every service. Brother Owen was at his best, and his messages were enjoyed by all. He is now President of Fletcher College, Iowa. He spoke of those dear old Canadian brothers in one of his sermons. Brother Smith said he preached at Beulah about twenty years ago, enquired about our dear Brother Baker, whom I told him had passed to his reward.

Many winter tourists dropped in at the last and were a great help in song and testimony. Many wealthy people, not living in Florida, give largely. Nazarene preachers were here from Miami to New York. We met a Mr. Brown, who told us his home was in Lower Brighton. He is now pastor of a Nazarene Church in Brooklyn. Some times the tide rose very high, and the preacher of the hour would have to wait. There were some good Nazarene women preachers, also missionaries from Japan and India.

A message was sent to Rev. H. C. Morrison on the occasion of his birthday. He sent the camp meeting committee a substantial check,

reports a steady gain in health, but finds his heavy tasks must be borne by others of his brethren. It was indeed encouraging to hear hundreds of people testify to the saving power of God, and the presence of the Holy Spirit in their lives. There were many fine young preachers, mostly Nazarenes. Their next camp meeting will be held at Indian Springs, a much stronger and larger camp than this—same date as one at Riverside. The evangelists for the Lakeland Camp Meeting next February, 1931, will be Revs. Babcock and Butler.

Brother Smith's itinerary is Methodist Conference at Penney Farms, then on to Miami with Rev. Howard Eckel, of the Nazarene Church for three Sundays, then a campaign at Taylor University, after which he will be engaged in Camp-meeting work this summer.

We leave for Boston soon, where we will spend a few days before going home.

We thank God for his many blessings and are more than ever determined to help push the battle for holiness unto the Lord.
