OBITUARY

Mrs. Phoebe E. Shaw

Mrs. Phoebe E. Shaw, wife of the late S. Haden Shaw, passed peacefully away on Wednesday, Feb. 26, at the home of her daughter, Mrs. G. B. Nixon, with whom she had lived for several years. Sister Shaw was born at Victoria on December 9, 1842, the daughter of Wm. and Susan Boyer. While Mrs. Shaw was a member of quite a large family, she is survived by only one sister, Mrs. Anetta Tracey, of West Somerville, Mass. She leaves also several nieces and nephews, and a very large number of friends. Sister Shaw had one brother, Rev. A. D. Boyer, who was a missionary to India for several years. Her marriage to S. Haden Shaw took place in 1866, and the remainder of her life was spent in Hartland and vicinity. She was converted and baptized at the early age of twelve years, and lived a consistent Christian life. When Holiness was first preached here by the late Rev. Aaron Hartt she embraced the doctrine and obtained the experience of entire sanctification. She and her noble husband (who had preceded her into the experience of full salvation several years) became charter members of the Alliance of the Reformed Baptist Church of Canada and also of the church at Hartland, where she was always actively engaged in religious work. For sixty-nine years of her life she was a successful Sunday school teacher, and as such greatly endeared herself to her pupils. She was always interested in civic righteousness, such as moral reform and temperance work, having been a member of the W. C. T. U. since the branch of that body was organized in Hartland in June 1888. It might be truly said of her that she was a woman of God "thoroughly furnished unto all good work.'

The funeral was held on Friday, Feb. 28th, from the Reformed Baptist Church. The W. C. T. U. attended in a body, and the president, Mrs. H. S. Dow, paid a tribute to the memory of our sister, who was a provincial life member for several years, and in 1927 was made a national life member of the W. C. T. U. Her pastor, Rev. H. S. Dow, officiated, using a text which she had selected found in Rev. 1:5-6. He was assisted in the service by Rev. P. J. Trafton, of Moncton, and Rev. E. W. Lester, of Woodstock; also Rev. Mr. Smith, of Hartland, and Rev. L. A. Fenwick, of Victoria, United Baptist. Miss Hazel Mullen, soloist, furnished appropriate music. In the passing of Sister Shaw, Hartland loses one of its oldest and most highly respected citizens. The large company in attendance at the funeral gave evidence of the high esteem in which she was held by all who knew her. Several were present from places outside of Hartland, including her niece, Mrs. (Rev.) W. E. Smith, of West Somerville, Mass. Interment took place in Greenwood cemetery. The floral tributes were very beautiful, and if each one to whom she had been a blessing should cast one flower on her last resting place, she might sleep beneath a field of roses.-H. S. D.
