### LIBERALITY OF AMERICANS

America is not bankrupt, by any means. The only trouble is that her wealth is being directed into wrong and useless channels. There was never a time when our savings deposits were equal to what they are today, nor a time when our people were able to purchase the comforts and many of the luxuries of life.

We recently came across the following figures compiled from government statistics, indicating how Americans spend their money. With such great prosperity as we enjoy in America since the abolition of the saloon, there is no calculating what we could do to minister to those nations in distress if we would only direct our money into the proper channels.

It is given out from our government statistics that Americans spend for the one diversion of pleasure, the movie, the sum of \$2,000,000,000 each twelve months. When I first read this. I thought it was \$2,000,000, but when I looked the second time I saw it was TWO BILLION! I almost lost my breath in surprise. And for what! MOVIES-every day movies, Sunday movies, midnight movies, blood-curdling movies, where the pistol and red shirt are the chief items of attraction; where one husband steals the wife of another man and flees for parts unknown; where children are taught how to blow up vaults, rob trains, break into houses, hold up banks, and every other devilment on the face of the earth. But what a vast amount of money is worse than wasted-spent in educating your children in the school of crime. Shall we ever wake up to the alarming situation!

Then the item of \$2,000,000,000 is given as expended for automobiles. This is not so amazing as the movie investment, for automobiles cost a lot of money, and are, in the main, used for legitimate and useful purposes. But would you have believed that movies cornered as much of our money as the automobile?

But the next item of expenditure almost staggers one's capacity to believe, and that winds in seeking for that which satisfieth T not.

Our women not only come in on the tobacco expenditures, but we find that their cosmetics and the various things they use to beautify themselves, cost the tremendous sum of \$750,000,000 each year. This looks as if an enormous price was paid to be beautiful —what they call beautiful—but in reality, they look more like clowns dressed for a circus performance. They do not appreciate Lord Byron's idea of beauty, when he said, "Woman least adorned, is most adorned." But you can't teach them otherwise.

Then we have the enormous amount spent for jewelry, \$500,000,000, and \$400,000,000 for toilet soaps, \$350,000,000 for candy and cake, which are detrimental to health in the most serious sense; soft drinks, \$350,000,000, when good pure water would be far better for their health; \$300,000,000 for furs, but they are so badly needed in July and August I suppose we shall have to allow them this convenient and comfortable piece of apparel.

Then we have the item of ice cream for which \$250,000.000 goes over the counters of our cold drink stands and lunch counters. No harm in ice cream, but could we not do on less and get along better?

Summing up the various items of expenditure in one year, the American people spend the incredible sum of \$22,700,000,000 "for that which is not bread," and which would have been better for their health and pocketbooks if they would have done without. Many hospital bills, doctors' bills, medicine bills and what not, would have been saved if the stomach had not been made a garbage can for all the non-essentials which we, as Americans, believe are a part of life. And I dare say, that thousands of the people who indulge in the above luxuries are professed Christians, but have not conscience enough to feel that they are doing anything wrong. I.—The Promise of the Father.
