Obedience to this verse would entirely eliminate many of the commonest faults of some church members and professing Christians of this day. Evil surmising is dishonest lustful and covetous thoughts are impure and unlovely and all evil speaking certainly is of bad report. And the Church would grow by leaps and bounds in Christian love and fellowship if no suspicious thoughts or report of another's mistake or blunder were ever allowed to remain in the mind to grow and magnify itself. All such thoughts should be promptly dismissed from the mind and ever after refused admittance.

And what a glorious thing it is to have a mind always filled with truth, justice, purity, and good reports. If the thoughts are kept entirely under the power of God then the life will certainly be in accord with His will for all evil words and actions are the result of evil thoughts. Our Lord's commands are never unreasonable so with His help it is possible to banish all of the wrong kind of thoughts and to have the right kind in their places.—
