### THE RISEN CHRIST

Those last never-to-be-forgotten days of Jesus upon earth, pass before us in panoramic view. We see His triumphant entry into Jerusalem where the multitudes cried, "Hosanna to the Son of David; Blessed is He that cometh in the name of the Lord; Hosanna in the highest."

Then entering into the temple, He drove out the buyers and sellers saying, "My house shall be called the house of prayer; but ye have made it a den of thieves."

A little later we hear him pronouncing woe upon the Scribes and Pharisees because of their hypocrisy, but His great heart of love yearns over them as He weeps over Jerusalem, for their house was to be left unto them desolate.

Again we see Him sitting upon the Mount

of Olives with His disciples, where He taught them many things, during those precious hours. He foretold the destruction of the temple, spoke the parable of the ten virgins, and gave a vivid description of the last judgment.

Then He was in the house of Simon the leper, where He was anointed with that precious ointment, "This," He said, "is for my burial."

Shortly after this He eats the Passover with His disciples, for the last time, going from there to the garden of Gethsemane, where He suffered in agony—alone.

We would gladly close our eyes to that long night of torture, where Jesus the Son of God was insulted, mocked, and spit upon, scourged and stripped of His raiment, but their cruelty seemed to have reached the limit when they pressed the crown of thorns upon His brow.

In the morning, we see Him bearing His cross to Calvary, where that awful tragedy took

place on that day of days—the unspeakable suffering that live long day was borne—alone.

Jesus made the Supreme sacrifice, to purchase redemption for mankind.

His body was wound in linen clothes, and placed in the new tomb; but the grave could not hold Him, and on the third day He came forth a conqueror, and the guarding angel said, "He is risen, behold the place where they laid Him."

During those forty days that followed, Jesus appeared to the disciples many times, and proved without a shadow of a doubt, that He was indeed The Risen Christ

Regardless of atheism, and modernistic views which are so prevalent, we rejoice that we are still standing on the fundamental truths of that Word, which shall never pass away.

### Report of Churches:

Beals—Our Sunday services are well attended. The mid-week prayer meeting are times of inspiration and blessing. There is a good interest among all our members. The pastor brings us strong inspirational messages, and we feel that the church is greatly blessed under his ministry.
