"MEAT IN DUE SEASON"

The above words are found in Matt. 24:45 and were spoken by our Lord in His discourse to the disciples on Mount Olives. The contents of this and the following chapters forming one continuous message, is often spoken of as Christ's second Sermon on the Mount. This wonderful prophetic utterance was given by Jesus just two days before the betrayal and crucifixion. Already the shadows of the cross were falling upon Him. The fact that He was fully conscious of these events before they were experienced, makes the contents of these chapters all the more precious to our hearts. His concern is not for Himself but for His servants. It was His interest in them that prompted Him to ask "Who then is a faithful and wise servant, whom his lord hath made ruler over his household; to give them meat in due season?" This verse is rich with wholesome and timely instruction for every minister today. In it is described

I. As to character, the minister is to have the quality of faithfulness. Every preacher is expected to be a steward of the grace of God. "It is required in stewards" says Paul, "that a man be found faithful" (1 Cor. 4:2). He must be faithful to God. He must be faithful to his message. He must be faithful to the people. He must be faithful in prayer and faithful in the study of the Scriptures. God does not require that all of His people be equally talented, but He does require that every servant be found faithful. When the Master returns He will call to Him every one of His servants and ask them to give an account of their stewardship. He will judge them not in respect to their talents, but in regard to their faithfulness. The faithful minister will be classified with "faithful Abraham" and a host of others who have won the same honor amidst the sufferings and trials peculiar to the work of the ministry.

Along with faithful is that other characteristic, wisdom. This is a coveted gift, and while some may have more than others yet God has encouraged the soul who is conscious of his need of more wisdom, by the nondiscriminating and unqualified promise, "If any man lack wisdom, let him ask of God, who giveth to all men liberally, and upbraideth not; and it shall be given him." God is the author of wisdom as well as of faith. The minister being God's representative should as far as possible manifest the faith of God and the wisdom of God.

II. As to the office, the minister of the Gospel is Divinely appointed as a ruler over God's household. The office is not inherited, though that was the order for the Levitical Priesthood. "And no man taketh this honor unto himself, but he that is called of God, as was Aaron." The ministry is not an occupation, it is a vocation. The minister who has not been and is not conscious of a "call" must necessarily be in doubt as to his work, or his services are motivated by a desire for mercenary remuneration or the praise of man. The minister who has the consciousness of being "sent from God" is the minister who brings people to God. He who has a call from God will experience the approval of God if he is faithful in discharging his duty. The office of the ministry is one of appointment from God and not of choice by man. Paul testified, "I thank Christ Jesus our Lord, who hath enabled me, for that he counted me faithful, putting me into the ministry" (1 Tim. 1:12).

III. The work of the minister is outlined by the Lord who makes the appointment—"to

give them" (the household of faith) "meat in due season." The minister is not only expected to give meat, but the proper kind of meat at the proper time. There are a variety of ways of serving food. Our natural appetites get tired of food that is always served in the same way. This is equally true of our spiritual appetites. Occasionally people like hash, but not frequently. The ministers would do well to proportion their sermons as God has the messages of the Word. Emphasize repentance, faith, sin, salvation, love, righteousness, holiness, heaven, hell, etc., in your messages to the extent that God has stressed them in the Scriptures. The fitness of time is as essential as the fitness of the food. As Christ was nearing the close of His ministry He emphasized the truth of His return, the certainty of it and the manner of it and finally gave to the disciples the signs by which they could discern the approximate time of His return. At the present time no minister need question the seasonableness of time for presenting the message of the near return of the Lord. "Blessed is that servant, whom his lord when he cometh shall find so doing."—Roy P. Adams, in Good Tidings.
