Some of the meetings ran pretty late but good results in souls getting saved. One night we did not close till past 12:30 and one boy got saved then. The electricity was shut off but a lamp was there.

It was a touch of real old fashioned times, twelve at the altar once. A mother backslidden, came out after a severe struggle, then went after her boy and he came out and was converted. Several very difficult cases have gotten through to victory and mean to go on. One man came to church for the first time in nine years, but he did not get saved. One or two more got as far as the church door but dared not go in. About fifty knelt at the altar. Out of these were sixteen children in Miriam's meetings.

Our church is greatly encouraged and have started a Bible Class, held weekly, for the study of God's word.

The Sunday School has taken on a new impetus while our Sunday morning Love Feast is blessed to attend and is difficult to close in time for the preaching service.

We are looking up for continued help and blessing for the many difficult cases of unsaved

and backslidden ones here in this place. Do continue to pray for us.

Sunday morning, 11 a. m. Rev. P. J. Trafton preached from Jas. 5:18 and he prayed again. This was a very helpful service showing us the need of prayer, and holding on by faith till the thing came to pass. A communion service followed.

Sunday afternoon, Rev. S. A. Mullen preached from I Samuel 17:37. His theme was accepting the challenge. This was a great message and many at the close went forward to signify that they were ready to accept the challenge of the day and push the battle for God and against sin. The power of the Holy Spirit was very real.

Rev. S. H. Mullen brought the closing message. His theme was "The two fallings into the hands of God." The power of God was in the service, one seeker was at the altar to be reclaimed and one raised the hand to be remembered in prayer. A testimony meeting followed.

The Quarterly meeting was a great help to the Church at Saint John, and we are looking to God for a great out-pouring of His Spirit in our coming revival services.
