"SHALL WE FIND FAITH

ON THE EARTH?"

As a conclusion to the parable of the unjust judge and the persevering widow, as recited in the eighteenth chapter of Luke, the Lord Jesus asked: "When the Son of Man cometh, shall He find faith on the earth?" Much consideration is due to this question in all periods, for faith is always vital to true religion. Its importance is described in part by the following exhortation by Spurgeon:

"Christian, take good care of thy faith, for recollect that faith is the only means whereby thou canst obtain blessings. Prayer cannot draw down answers from God's throne except it be the earnest prayer of the man who believes. Faith is the telegraphic wire which links earth to heaven, on which God's messages of love fly so fast that before we call He answers, and while we are yet speaking He hears us. But if that telegraphic wire of faith be snapped, how can we obtain the promise? Am I in trouble? I can obtain help for trouble by faith. Am I beaten about by the enemy? My soul on her dear Refuge leans by faith. But take faith away, then in vain I call to God. There is no other road betwixt my soul and heaven. Blockade the road, and how can I communicate with the Great King? Faith links me with divinity. Faith clothes me with the power of Jehovah. Faith insures every attribute of God in my defense. It helps me to defy the hosts of hell. But without faith how can I receive anything from the Lord? Oh, then, Christian, watch well thy faith."

Some time in its history, the world will be ready for the rise and rule of the anti-Christ. In preparation for that time and condition faith in Christ will undergo great changes. The Christian faith will lose its saving qualities and be ready to compromise with other religions on the basis of a surrender of its vital elements. The divinity of Christ, the necessity of the Atonement, the fact of the Atonement, the reality of the bodily resurrection of Jesus,—well, the whole system of the orthodox faith is necessary to its operation. And it is a very alarming feature in our day that Modernism is at work gleefully destroying that system of faith in Christ. Dark days are here for the people who contend for such a faith for themselves and their children, and darker days are ahead.

Here are some samples of what we are talking about. Says Dr. William McDougall of Duke University: "Never before the present century has sheer dogmatic materialism been propagated by a vast system of public instruction and by universities of the highest standing, counting their students by tens of thousands." (Dr. McDougall was speaking of "behaviorism" which may be defined as Modernism expressing itself in the realm of psychology.

A statement attributed to Dr. Henry Fairfield Osborn, an eminent scientist not generally considered as an orthodox Christian teacher is: "The contest of theology with science has been fatal to the Christian code of morals. . . . The revolution is sweeping with tremendous force among the young and their moral sense is lost." (The above are quoted from a sermon by Dr. John E. Fraser in the Watchman-Examiner under the title: "Faith on the Earth, or, Is the World Going Red?").—Wesleyan Methodist.
