HOLINESS IN THE THOUGHTS

Thought is as incessant as the play of the lungs or the throbbing of the heart; and, to a certain point, we are not responsible for our thoughts. They come pouring in upon us from a thousand sources—every sight and sound, every word and feeling, stirring the thinking powers. Every thought that lodges in the mind is the seed of further harvest; while the law of association, too subtle to be traced, or even conceived, links together scenes and subjects, feelings and memories, as far asunder as the heavens and the earth.

In considering what influence holiness has upon this life of thought, we must remember that no degree of goodness will keep thoughts of evil from entering the mind. These will come from the very sight of the sin with which we are doing battle, from our contact with the world that lieth in wickedness," and from the malignant suggestions of the enemy of souls.

But while thoughts of sin are unpreventable in our present state of being, our responsibility begins with our treatment of them. A man's character is demonstrated by his cherished thoughts. "As a man thinketh in his heart" —as he wills and chooses to deal with his thoughts-"so is he." Holiness will lead a man instantly to reject sinful thoughts. To indulge them would be to commit sin in the heart, and in turn thoughts of sin into sinful thoughts. But by the transforming power of divine grace, the heart that once loved sin, hates ithates it in all its forms and disguises—as truly as the body resents the presence of poison, of whatever kind, and however dispensed. God calls sin—not sin in any particular phase, but sin in every possible manifestation—"that abominable thing which I hate"; and the heart that is sanctified has the same abhorrenceinfinitely less, but of the same nature. So the pure heart will make the pure mind, and thoughts of that which is detested will be right quickly chased away.

On the other hand, holiness will always help to fill the mind with good thoughts. It is a law of our being that the mind delights to dwell upon that which is loved, and, most of all, upon that which is loved supremely. Now the holy heart loves goodness-goodness in the abstract, and however translated into word or deed. The pure heart is akin to all the goodness existing in the moral universe. And not only so, but with all its powers it loves Him who is the infinite and eternal Fount of good, the all-good. It is this affection that makes it pure. And so the heart cleansed from sin, loving God and goodness with a dominant affection, will delight in all holy thoughts. In a remarkable passage, St. Paul says: "Whatsoever things are true, whatsoever things are honest, whatsoever things are just, whatsoever things are pure, whatsoever things are lovely, whatsoever things are of good report; if there be any virtue, and if there be any praise, think on these things." And it is precisely this that the pure-hearted do.—Heart and Life.
