#### EDITORIAL

#### THE PROMISES OF GOD

ates, "exceeding great" means that they represent the Omnipotent Power of the ever living God. "Exceeding precious" means they represent His exhaustless wealth. The promises represent the blood of Jesus Christ in the same sense that bank notes represent the gold and silver that is deposited in the bank. Any one that ever got under the blood of Jesus Christ were delivered from all their sins and out of sorrows and difficulties and were made righteous, happy, well, and prosperous in all things. To apply the promises exactly as they read, places us under the blood and brings an immediate manifestation of God's power in delivering us. Naaman, the Syrian is an example of this. He was a great man that knew not God, nor His healing power, and was afflicted with leprosy. He was advised to go to the prophet in Samaria, who told him to dip seven times in Jordan and his body would be healed. At first he refused, but later he accepted the advice of his servants and did exactly what God had directed, through the prophet, and received exactly what God had promised; and also great spiritual enlightenment and strength, which enabled him to become a true follower of God.

You will notice the promises all have "yes" to them. For all the promises of God in Him are yea, and in Him, Amen". (2nd Cor. 1:20.). This means that we do not have to wait for any special revelation of sight or feeling to know whether our prayers have been heard. The promises assure us that our prayers have been both heard and answered at the time of prayer, and we can accept it as a fact, without further questioning of any kind. They also have "yes" on the face of them and there is not any room for the slightest doubt in any of the promises of God. In Isaiah 55:7 and 1 John 1:9, we have the promises for pardon and cleansing of sin. "Let the wicked forsake his way and the unrighteous man his thoughts; and let him return unto the Lord and He will have mercy upon him; and to Our God, for He will abundantly pardon". "If we confess our sins, He is faithful and just to forgive us our sins, and to cleanse us from all unrighteousness."

These promises declare three facts; that God will have mercy upon us; abundantly pardon and forgive us, and cleanse us from all sin. If we accept these promises at their face value, we can be absolutely certain that we are pardoned and cleansed the moment we have prayed, as these promises direct. If we meet the conditions of these promises, we are to look for and believe for the promised blessing, which will enable God to exactly fulfil His unchangeable Word. If we apply and use the promises exactly as God has given them, it will cause a death to self, as there is no room for the plans and power of the self-Life in any of the promises of God. That is the reason Satan tries so hard to get us to discount, ignore and neglect, "the exceeding great and precious promises of God."

this country. At the close of the tour he reported that he was practically unable to find prohibition-that liquor was always available when he wished it. He made another tour this year, and at the end visited the office of a friend in Chicago. He begged his friend to tell him where he could get a drink, and admitted that the American people were beginning to obey the prohibition law.

The testimony of Commander Evangeline Booth as given in an issue of the Christian Herald agrees with that of the German. She reminds us that before prohibition was voted the Salvation Army would often collect as many as 1,200 drunken men and women in one night on the Bowery in New York-men and women too drunk to take care of themselves. Now she says that the average is not more than seven a night. She also indicates that in the Memorial Home they house 4,800 men a week and the average is about one drunken man in a thousand. She claims that drinking has dropped sixty per cent. We suspect that Evangeline Booth knows what she is talking about, and we also trust her to tell the truth.—The Free Methodst.
