Apparently this particular message was for display in the window of this home on Sundays. What, can one have personal profit in sight and turn it down just to keep God's day? This woman could.

But here we are reminded that certain young people, attending high school and college, must use God's day for the study of their secular subjects that they may recite well and pass the examinations. They have already learned to spell the first day of the week but they have not learned to keep it holy as the Lord commanded. Now they are going on to learn many other wonderful things, but have not learned that to treat God so that He can be constantly in partnership with us is better in the long run than hours, grades, and dollars gained by compromise. Money and scholarship are both desirable, but above these things, as far as the stars are above the trees, is character. That is true of this life. It is true of the next.—The Free Methodist.

The fact which impresses us in our investigation is the absence of the aorist and the presence of the present tense whenever the conditions of final salvation are stated. Our inference is that the conditions of ultimate salvation are continuous, extending through probation, and not completed in any one act. The great requirement is faith in Jesus Christ. A careful study of the Greek will convince the student that it is a great mistake to teach that a single act of faith furnishes a person with a paid-up, non-forfeitable policy, assuring the holder that he will inherit eternal life, or that a single energy of faith secures a through ticket for heaven, as is taught by the Plymouth Brethren and by some popular lay evangelists. The Greek tense shows that faith is a state, a habit of mind, into which the believer enters at justification.—Dr. Daniel Steele, in "Mile-Stone Papers."
