The S. S. Convention was held in the Reformed Baptist Church at Calais at the close of the District Quarterly Meeting business session on Saturday afternoon, Dec. 11, 1931. President Rev. F. A. Dunlop occupied the chair. The president opened the meeting with scripture reading and prayer was offered by Lic. E. R. Bradley. Due to the absence of the secretary, E. R. Bradley was elected secretary pro tem. Minutes of the last meeting were read and approved. The following ministers and delegates responded to the roll call: Rev. F. A. Dunlop, Mrs. H. C. Sanders, H. C. Wilson, E. R. Bradley. Delegates: Seal Cove, Mrs. F. A. Dunlop; Jonesport, Mrs. Beals; Wood Island, Eugene Wilcox; Calais, P. L. McMillan.

Reports from the following schools were read: Seal Cove, North Head, Beals, Jonesport, Calais and a verbal report of the S. S. work at Wood Island was given by Eugene Wilcox. The schools all reported an increase in interest and attendance and good spiritual progress since the last convention.

The meeting was opened for general discussion which was very beneficial. Resolved that Rev. F. A. Dunlop be appointed to visit Sunday schools on the Islands, and Lic. H. C. Wilson be appointed to visit Sunday schools on the mainland of this district, the object of the visits being to observe the welfare and management of the schools and to report at the next meeting the spiritual condition of each school as they found it. Convention stating that the feeling of this Quarterly Meeting was that it should be held some evening during the Quarterly Meeting.
