AN APPRECIATION OF THE LATE MISS A. E. JOHNSON

On Tuesday afternoon, Sept. 16th, amid sunshine and flowers, there was laid to rest as quietly and unobtrusively as she lived, the mortal remains of Alice Emma Johnston, art mistress of the Girls' High School, Durban.

For nearly a quarter of a century Miss Johnson devoted herself to teaching her pupils a love of the beautiful. In particular did she teach them to appreciate the lovely wild flowers of Natal, so that there are today many hundreds of girls scattered over the Province who are able not only to paint the special flowers of their district, but to make charming and original designs based on their peculiar characteristics.

In addition to her skill in painting and design, Miss Johnston was a past mistress in fine needlework and leather craft. Many a night did she spend helping disabled soldiers from the War to while away the weary hours of convalescence by teaching them to tool and design various articles of leather; for she was a kindly soul, ever rady to give of her skill and her substance to those less well-endowed than herself, so that there are many today who will miss her helpful presence.

One hears of many acts of kindness performed by her—a tent provided to shelter one poor family; the arrear rent paid to keep the roof over the heads of another; a picnic arranged for a group of working girls; dainty garments made for the little children of the Creche; a child's education provided for, and so on ad infinitum.

It is sad to think of this useful life being cut off so prematurely, but she has left behind her an example of patient industry, kindly benevolence and simple Christian living that will long be remembered by her friends and pupils.

Of her it may truly be said, "Blessed are the dead who die in the Lord, for they rest from their labours and their works do follow them."

Among the senders of wreaths and flowers to the funeral were the Old Girls, the Staff and the Pupils of the Girls' High School, the Dumb Friends League and the Bulwer Park Baptist Church.—(Contributed.)
