I might say from the very first day I visited there I was very much impressed that we should have Sunday services at this place, as we see a good field and hungry hearts. We have an appointment there for this coming Sunday.

We are expecting to go to Badaza which is near Swaziland, for a few days also, but at present we have a badly burned child here for treatment, but as soon as the child goes home we are then expecting to go. (D. V.)

The holidays are over now, and the school children seem glad to be back to their studies again.

On July 26th, we had Big Sunday here. Mr. MacDonald and George, both were here. We had a good service. Five women were baptized and several babies were given to the church, among them was Isaya's fourth little daughter of six weeks.

Last Tuesday we had a good meeting not far from here. A good number were present and one gave herself to the Lord. On Friday I went to a heathen home on Kip Vaal quite a distance away arriving there at noon. Shortly after the people all came in good time, about thirty in all, twenty were raw heathen. Isaya and Alice were unable to go with me, and as I looked into these faces, I longed that they might be there to help in the service. I looked to the Lord for His blessing upon us, and to bless His Work and He did. The spirit of conviction was felt and we are going back again soon.
