Thus far eighteen have found their way to the altar while many others are requesting prayer and feeling their way toward God. I don't know just when we will be through here. We just want to do God's will.

Dear Highway Friends:

Many of you are probably wondering how God's work is progressing in Calais. We are happy to report victory through the Blood of the Lamb. We feel God's presence with us and

all services are well attended. Four have knelt at the altar for pardon of sins.

We find the people here are a kind, sociable folk who are much concerned for the well-being of their pastor and his wife. On "Hallowe'en night" we were invited to the home of Mr. and Mrs. Edwin Stanhope. We were not told just why we were invited but we expected a Hallowe'en frolic. We were greeted by a masked individual and ushered into the presence of about thirty people who are faithful church goers. After enjoying a good program that had been planned for entertainment, the pastor had a lot of fun in the kitchen bobbing for apples with the children. We were then called to stand before the dining-room table which was loaded with packages for us to open. We found we had been presented with 1 cake, 1½ dozen cookies, 40 lbs of sugar, 25 lbs. of flour, 3 lbs. of crackers, 2 cans of milk, 1 can of tomato soup, 4 cans of peaches, 1 can of pineapple, 3 cans of corn, 1 can of beets, 1 can of peas, 1 can of grapefruit, 1 can of Dutch cleanser, 1 package of salt, 1 package of corn starch, 3 packages of rice, 1 package of pancake flour, 2 packages of raisins, 4 jars of jelly, 4 jars of pickles, 1 jar of mince-meat, 1 sauce pan, 1 stew kettle, 1 large sack of potatoes, 1 large pumpkin and 2 squash. All this was one large expression of what our good people here are doing for us all the time. Words failed to express our thanks as our evening's party closed with prayer by the pastor. We never before spent such a thrilling and enjoyable Hallowe'en.
