Miller's Corner, N. S.—This is a new school just organized with a membership of 32 and 5 teachers and 12 of a cradle roll; Mr. Walter Budd, Superintendent; Mr. John Blockney, Secretary. Mr. John Whitewood, delegate to Convention.

I would again urge and request all Sunday Schools of the District to send in written reports in time for the Convention. We need the cooperation of all our schools and then the Sunday School Association will be of great assistance to the Schools; to this end was it organized.

Will all our schools help during the coming year? We need you.

Some very practical suggestions were advanced by Rev. I. F. Keirstead, and Mrs. H. K. Ingersoll as to teaching of the primary and junior classes of our Sunday Schools, such as the Lord's Prayer, The Ten Commandments, The Apostle's Creed, and certain portions of Scripture essential to Salvation.

Moved by Rev. P. J. Trafton, seconded by Rev. I. F. Keirstead, that a Committee consisting of Mrs. I. M. Keirstead, S. H. Bradley and Mrs. H. K. Ingersoll, be appointed to take up this matter and see what can be done in getting a help book along these lines to be used in our Sunday Schools for the instructing of the young, and report at the next Convention.

Offering taken at this Convention amounted to \$2.41.

Moved and seconded that this Convention

adjourn to meet Friday afternoon at the time and place of the next Quarterly District meeting. Carried.

Norman was accepted at first, but Charley was not at first, as he had a few marks lower than Norman and the class made up of highest marks till they had all they desired.

Prayer and waiting upon God for ways and means was daily continued by the family, and God did supply every need, even to a kind friend giving Norman a ride in her auto from St. Stephen to North Devon.

Charley started in school here to prepare for further advance, when it came, and our principal, Miss Gallagher, offered to give him all the extra time she could.

Judson decided he would take Grade XI. in St. John High, if he could enter there. Many problems presented themselves, such as boarding place, money for the extra tuition, etc., etc. But when the time came for him to go, God opened the way wonderfully and he is there doing well.

We continued to pray for the way to be opened up for Charley to join Norman at Normal. They had never been separated. Each could be a help to the other, each had same qualifications and he could not get on so well here.

Norman had been in school five days when he was told to send for Charley to come by following telegram: "Accepted. Come as early as possible next week." This came Friday afternoon and he left Monday morning, joining Norman that night. Many problems were met and we again found God can change men's minds and open closed doors for his trusting children.

How was it done? I cannot tell fully, but a friend saw the ones in power and some way the change was made. Also our principal here wrote in Charlie's behalf. "Oh! That men would praise the Lord for His goodness and for His wonderful works to the children of men!

Both boys are together and doing well and God is supplying their needs.

Then Grace has taken up the work at Wood's Harbour, N. S., and greatly interest-

ed in the people there, expecting to see souls saved and helped.

So our children have each found the place God wanted them to have and we are here alone, as far as children are concerned. But our hearts are happy in Jesus and His work here.

Well, our Quarterly Meeting has come and gone and left a blessing behind it of encouragement and help, and one hungry soul came forward for sanctification.

Brethren, pray for us here. We need a good old fashioned revival and God is able. Also remember us as parents that our faith fail not and that we continue to cast all our burdens on Him who has promised to sustain us.
