On New Year's Eve many of the church members gathered at the home of Brother Frank Mylan, where the closing hours of the old year were spent in an old fashioned, devil-driving watch-night meeting. For many present this was the first watch night service ever attended. A real season of blessing was enjoyed and all present felt stronger spiritually when they left the meeting. The prayer meetings of our church are also well attended.

In spite of the fact that only a few members have had consistent employment for the past few months the pastor and his young wife have been well provided for. Although Sunday offerings are small on account of working conditions here, the Lord

sees to it that we do not lack and suffer hunger or want for any good thing. We thank all our good people for their kindness to us, and trust we shall be faithful in ministering unto them the words of eternal life.

We plan to put on special services soon. Pray for us.
