action on behalf of better Government.

4. That we use our franchise not only according to our pledge but also to elect for Councillors and members of the School Boards or our locality, those who stand for all forms of moral reform and good government, and who are Christians at heart. When expedient we shall use our influence to put a W. C. T. U. woman on the school board.

5. That each Union will if possible appoint one or more representatives to attend the trial of available open court cases and report as desired. Such a policy where expedient would link up more closely our work with court procedure and with court problems and on the other hand would help to practically demonstrate and our interest and our influence as a potent

factor for better government.

6. That a section at the back of our Annual Report be given to the subject of Abstracts from various of New Brunswick's Laws. Liquor, lawlessness and crime are three inseparable agencies that spell the doom of

a nation.

When we shall have succeeded in putting liquor out of business in our province, we shall have succeeded in large measure in striking a killing blow at lawlessness and crime.

We can make our Province dry and law abiding. Shall we not try more and more.

God with us, Christ for us . . . and all the Temperance forces working together for law and order.

It can de done—Let's do it!

Returning after Beulah we were delighted to find the church and church property undergoing extensive repairs.

The vestibule was renovated from top to bottom. The old foundation was torn down and replaced with a fine cement wall; also cement steps leading into the vestibule which give the building a very neat and substantial appearance.

The inside has a nicely polished hard-wood floor. The walls and ceiling sheathed with Douglas fir. The old doors also were replaced by new, making a very fine job throughout.

The foundation of the main building was repaired. A few minor improvements were made, and then with a good coat of paint applied freely to both the walls and roof, the entire building presents an inviting place for worship. There was also a fine work of grading done, making a great improvement to the church lawn.

The parsonage was given whatever repairs found necessary and also a thorough painting.

The barn was resilled, refloored and painted. New doors hung, etc., so that the property as a whole is in first class condition and is a credit to the community.

The work was done by a few skilled workmen and a large number of volunteers, thus, the whole job was accomplished by a surprisingly small figure in actual dollars and cents for the amount of work done.
