## REVERENCE

Christian workers who desire to be successful in the ministry of intercession will do well to ponder this subject of reverence toward God. Sincerity and humility are difficult to counterfeit, and as important as they are rare among professed Christian people. Con over the Bible record of appearances before God and see if you can find a single incident where the interview was successful if it were not marked by great reverence toward God. Cain spoke impudently to God and was punished, while Ahab, Israel's most unworthy king, obtained a remarkable dispensation of mercy at God's hand because he bowed with reverence and pled his case. God heard many earnest pleas from Moses and always with satisfaction, because he was always reverent except once, and all who read Moses' hasty words at Meribah feel they were unworthy of him, when he exclaimed, "Hear now, ye rebels, must we fetch you water out of this rock?" Jesus, our great example, always spoke of God and to Him with great reverence.

Instructions in Ecclesiastes are given for church goers, where we read, "Keep thy foot when thou goest to the house of God, and be more ready to hear than to give the sacrifice of fools . . . Be not rash with thy mouth, and let not thine heart be hasty to utter any thing before God: for God is in heaven, and thou upon earth: therefore let thy words be few." (Eccles. 5:1, 2).

William E. Gladstone, noted British statesman, during his lifetime wrote the following advice to church goers:

"On your way to church, be thoughtful, be silent, or say but little, that little good. Do not stay outside; go in at once. Time spent inside is precious.

"In church, kneel down humbly and pray. Remember the Presence into which you have come. Do not look about to see who are coming in; it matters nothing to you; attend to yourself, fasten yourself firm on the holy service.

"After church, be in prayer, be intent. Do not be in haste to speak, the church is God's house. Be quiet and thoughtful as you go through the church yard.

"On your way home, be careful of your talk, or the world will slip back into your heart. Remember where you have been and what you have done, resolve to live a better life."

Parents with small children should be encouraged and assisted in bringing their children to church in early childhood, but parents should not allow their children the privilege of straying out of the family pew, to wander at large through the building and especially to disturb the service by running around the pulpit stand and climbing up on the altar railing. Reverence for the great work that the church is called upon to do suggests a reasonable decorum in even the most humble place of worship. Eternal destinies may there be settled in any service. True and sincere reverence always helps in God's cause, irreverence may do it great damage.—The Wesleyan Methodist.
