Dear Highway:

It has been a long time since I reported anything in your columns, so a few lines at this time may not be amiss. Sometimes I think that I have so little to report that would be of interest to others, that I refrain altogether. However, as a church and people we have not been wholly inactive. The regular services have been maintained all the long winter, and though sometimes the numbers were very few indeed, there was not a Sunday without a service. Our great difficulty here is that our people are so scattered.

During the month of April we had revival meetings for four Sundays, with H. S. Mullen as evangelist. This was at a very bad time of year on account of the roads, and the attendance was small, but a few, mostly young people, attended faithfully, and quite a number received definite help. Brother Mullen preached with his usual fervor, and deep conviction settled down upon the people, some yielded, while others turned the message away. Mrs. H. S. Mullen assisted with the singing, at the altar, and preached at least once during the meetings. The last Sunday, and the finest Sunday of the series, Brother Mullen was sick and could not preach, so I filled in alone. As a result of the meeting three young women were baptized and received into the church, and a number of young people professed to receive the blessing of holiness. As a whole the church was blessed and edified.

Our church has purchased a piece of land that adjoins the parsonage and church lot, which will add greatly to the convenience and value of our church property. This land will give ample room for a garden spot, or if properly cultivated, would cut nearly enough hay to winter a cow. The Church gave the writer a unanimous call to remain for the fourth year and he has accepted. There is good harmony amongst the members of the church, and between pastor and people, and there is good reason to look ahead to a year of victory. Our prayer meetings are well attended considering everything, and they are truly times of blessing.

We would like to see things move faster, but we realize that the church moves against tremendous resistance and the wonder is that we make any progress.

We are glad to note progress in our sister churches and rejoice to know that God still lives and answers prayer.

Temperance Column

Resolution passed at Quarterly Meeting of District No. 2:

To the Governments of New Brunswick and Nova Scotia.

Honorable Gentlemen:

We the Reformed Baptist, District Quarterly Meeting, in session at Killam's Mills, comprised of Churches in New Brunswick and Nova Scotia, wish to call your attention to the following resolution:

Whereas the sale of liquor for beverage purposes is having a degrading effect upon the morals of our people and whereas a high percentage of all accidents are caused by the use of strong drink and whereas our young men and women, and in some cases even our boys and girls in their teen ages are becoming habitual users of strong drink and whereas every crime and sin follows in the wake of drunkenness and whereas our nation is suffering from a desperate financial depression and every dollar is needed to feed and clothe the families who are in distress and whereas the responsibility for the sale of liquor largely lies with your Governments for having forced liquor control upon us,

Be it resolved that we hereby voice our unqualified disapproval of "Government Control", or any other form of the sale of liquor for other than medicinal purposes.

Neither can we give our support morally or by vote to any Government which has for its platform the legalized sale of liquor, but will do all we can to elect men of high and honorable ideals who have as their goal the lifting of moral standards of living which we believe can only come about by a return of our fair Provinces to Prohibition.

We ask that you give your earnest consideration to the above resolution and do all in your power to better the temperance situation now existing in our Provinces.
