TEMPERANCE RESOLUTIONS

We, the Reformed Baptist Alliance in annual session at Beulah Camp Ground, June 30th, 1932, hereby place ourselves on record as reaffirming our former stand on the liquor question.

It is evident that the Government sale of liquor in Canada has signally failed to bring about the aims of the promoters.

We declare ourselves opposed to the sale of liquor for beverage purposes and believe that the best interests of the people are brought about by the prohibition of the manufacture, sale, transportation and importation of all intoxicating beverages.

We further strongly urge that a continuous educational campaign be carried on in all our churches, instilling into the minds of our children and young people the baneful results of tampering with intoxicating drinks in any form, as it tends to the breaking down and the corrupting of morals.

We strongly urge all our members in the State of Maine that they stand firm in their support of the Eighteenth Amendment; and that they oppose any modification of the same.

We commend the Island Province for their stand in maintaining the prohibitory law.
