Clifton W. Schofield

A distressing accident occurred at Lubec, Me., June 28th, 1932, whereby Clifton W. Schofield, of Seal Cove, lost his life. He with his wife, little son and brother, Vance, were sailing from Lubec to Roger's Island in a small boat. A sudden gust of wind caused the boat to capsize, the occupants being all thrown into the water. The accident was witnessed by the young man's father, who was on the shore, but having no boat was not able to go to their assistance. After staying afloat for some time, Mr. Schofield sank, the others were able to reach the overturned boat, and were rescued by Mr. Farmer, of North Lubec. The body was recovered on Thursday, June 30th, and brought to Seal Cove. Funeral services were held on July 2nd, conducted by the writer, assisted by Lic. Rue Ingalls. Mr. Schofield, who was 22 years of age, was of a sunny, cheerful disposition, and his passing in this way especially, shocked the whole community.

He leaves, besides his wife and child, his father, Horace, four sisters, Mrs. Lee Wilcox and Mrs. Chester Green, of Wood Island, Mrs. Joseph Green of Seal Cove and Mrs. Wm. Haskin, of Lubec Me., also two brothers, Melvin and Vance. A large congregation at the funeral, and the floral tributes testified to the interest of the community.

The invasion of Sunday by this sort of thing causes a serious disturbance of that quiet which has ever been associated with the day.

The use of the radio for advertising has become common today, and this is not confined to the week-day programmes but appears on Sunday also. Advertising ought to be entirely eliminated from Canadian programmes on Sunday because it would be out of harmony with the Canadian view of Sunday observance.

Petty trading in towns and cities constitutes, without doubt, the most numerous class of offences against Sunday law.

But more important than the pressure of the law is the informing and inspiring of public opinion. In this work we need the co-operation of the educational and regenerative forces and agencies of the land. Frequent sermons on the subject on the part of ministers, frequent discussions of Sunday conduct in young peoples' societies, as well as instruction in the Sunday School and home, will do much to inform and awaken the intelligence and conscience of the people, old and young.

Spengler tells us the only hope for our civilization is attention to the inner life, and Keyserling believes that it can only be saved by changing the hearts of men. These are the things which Sunday stands for, and which its leisure and quiet offer opportunity for doing. It is the spiritual values of Sunday which are in grave peril today, and to save them is the duty of the church, the home, and the school.
