The committee was so large that neither the house of representatives nor the senate chamber could accommodate us; so on the capitol steps we were received by Senator Shepherd of the senate and Congressman Hobson of the house, who received our message which was introduced in both house and senate that day. The message was delivered by ex-Governor Patterson, of Tennessee.

Amongst us was an old man by the name of Major Mervin, who was introduced to us as having been one of President Lincoln's private admirers. He was a very tall man with rather long white hair. Standing before us, he seemed like one of the prophets, and subsequent developments have proven that he was. His remarks were in the main as follows: "If this measure, which we have this day submitted to the congress, becomes a part of our constitution, you must not expect our country to become dry over night. It may take a generation or possibly two. Intoxicating liquor has existed and the people have drunk it to their own detriment since the days of Noah. It is associated with strong traditions and backed by tremendous capital, and it will take a long time to overcome both. It has been a long and hard fight to carry this prohibition measure to the capital of our nation as we have done it today, but I believe we are all agreed that the cause is worth all the time, effort and substance contributed to get prohibition, and it will be worth as much to keep it and make it effective. Let no one think the fight is done. This only marks the end of the beginning of the battle. The greatest part of it lies ahead of us, but what was worth giving to get it is also worth giving to keep it."

When asked to tell us what Lincoln's attitude was relative to the liquor question, he said: "Lincoln told me one day, 'Less than twenty-five years ago in New Orleans I saw them sell people. I saw them tear families apart and sell them like cattle. I also noticed that some of these people, who were being sold, were intoxicated with liquor. I vowed then that I would devote my time, talents and strength that there might not be a slave or a drunkard in our fair land. By the help of the Almighty and the American people, we have lived to see the first realized, and I pledge all that I am and have to the realization of the second.' And that very day Lincoln was shot. That tells you Lincoln's attitude on the liquor question, and I appeal to all of you, gathered here at this momentous occasion, to convey to the people of your communities Lincoln's attitude to the liquor question and appeal to them to follow his example." Major Mervin's remarks made a tremendous impression on me, and I have repeated them on many occasions. We laud Lincoln on his birthday as our greatest man and praise his many virtues, but if we really admire and appreciate his virtues, those same virtues would be just as admirable and desirable in ourselves. If all those, who express their appreciation of Lincoln and his virtues, would apply them to their own lives, it might not require two generations to make our fair land a dry land, and if our society women who. clamor for the repeal of the Eighteenth Amendment would try to live with a drunkard for a month, they would clamor for its retention, observance, and give it their hearty support By Rev. We were really two thousand, but when we marched up Pennsylvania avenue and entered the capitol grounds, we were joined by a committee of one thousand from the W. C. T. U., so that we were in fact a committee of three thousand members. It was one of the largest committees that ever called on congress.
