IS IT SCRIPTURAL?

(Continued from last Issue)

III.—Is it Scriptural to Pray for World-Wide Evangelization outside the Body of Christ?

We believe that God's answer is yes—because (as set forth by the writer in "The Sunday School Times" of November 29th, 1919):

1. Sin is world-wide (Rom. 3:10-18, 23).

2. The hopelessness of man apart from Christ is **world-wide** (Acts 4:12).

3. The apostasy of the professing Church is world-wide (2 Thess. 2:3; 2 Tim. 3:1-5).

4. The redemptive love of God in Christ is world-wide (John 3:16), making possible a world-wide remedy for sin and a world-wide invitation to salvation (John 1:29; Isa. 45:22).

5. Access to God by prayer through Christ is **world-wide** (I. Tim. 2:8). This is true wherever there is a saint or the name of Christ is known (Rom. 10:13-18).

6. The need (Luke 10:2), the opportunity (John 4:35), and the command (Luke 24:29; Acts 1:8; Mark 16:15) are world-wide.

7. The coming of Christ will be hastened, the effects of which will be world-wide—

(1) In the rapture of the true church. (I. Thess. 4:16, 17) and the rewarding of believers (2 Cor. 5:10).

(2) In judgment upon the apostate Church (2 Thess. 2:10-12).

(3) In the manifestation of the "man of sin" (2 Thess. 2:3-10).

(4) In unparalleled tribulation upon Israel and the world (Matt. 24:15-26; Jer. 30 and 31; Rev. 4 to 19).

(5) In the destruction of Israel's enemies (Rev. 19:17-21) and the conversion of Israel as a nation (Zech. 12:10-14).

(6) In the sifting and judgment of the Gentile nations (Matt. 25:31-46).

(7) In the establishment in righteousness of Christ's millennial kingdom—in extent **WORLD-WIDE** (Psa. 2; Hab. 2:14; Rev. 20:4-6).

CONCLUDING SUMMARY OF REASONS FOR PRAYER

1. THE "GREAT COMMISSION" TO THE CHURCH. "Go ye into all the world, and preach the Gospel to every creature" (Mark 16:15). To whom spoken? To the coming members of the body of Christ. "But tarry ye until ye be endued with power." Has the "great commission" been obeyed? Why not? Because the Church, having lost its early vision, has lost also its "first love" and its power, and these can be restored only through repentance and prayer. (See Revelation 2 and 3).

2. THE GREAT COMMAND TO "ALL MEN." "But now" (in this dispensation) God command "all men everywhere to rerepent" (Act 17:30). Are we still living in the dispensation of grace? Through whom does God command "all men eaverywhere to repent," if not through the body of Christ? Has the message of repentance and salvation been carried to "all men?" By whom is it to be carried? Will either a paralytic or lethargic body carry it? No, not until changed, and only
