Dear Highway Friends:

I am writing you a brief report of Bible work I did for three months this summer. On May 2nd of 1932 I started work for the New Brunswick Bible Society (a branch of the British and Foreign Bible Society). I worked in the following places in York and Northumberland Counties: Gerary, North and South Devon, Marysville, Barker's Point, Nashwaaksis, Mouth of Keswick, Douglass, Burt's Corner, Zeland Station, Royal Road, Killary Road, Dorn Ridge, Kingsley, North and

South Durham, Taymouth, Zionville, Tay River, Nashwaak Bridge, Red Rock, Stanley, Frederickburg, Currysburg, Tayfalls and Woodland, Tay Creek and North Tay, Cross Creek, Glen Road, Williamsburg, Napadogan, Maple Grove, McGivney, Avery Portage, Boiestown, Penniac, Mount Hope, Tayes River Road, Parker's Ridge, Haysville, Bloomfield Ridge, Holtville, Ludlow, Price Settlement, McNamee, Carroll's Crossing, New Bandon, Doaktown, Blissfield, making thorough house to house calls on all these places and their vicinities, especially the back settlements. I also worked two days at Killam's Mills and vicinity, making in all 2894 calls, distributing 2007 pieces of Scriptures valued at \$369.85.

This also included the Bible Stand at Beulah Camp Ground. My sales amounted to much more this summer than last, both at the Camp Ground and also through the country. Through many of the back settlements I found the people very poor and destitute. I found 41 families without any portion of the Word of God. Of course I left each one of them a Bible, receiving the promise from them that they would read it. I also found people generally more desirous for a Bible and a turning to the Word than ever before. I sold and gave Bibles to several Roman Catholic homes, after finishing up the time allotted to me. On returning to the Bible House, St. John, I called at Chipman and Cumberland Bay and several other places where I had worked last summer, making good sales. I could relate many more instances if space would permit in connection with this work, but we leave the work with Him Who has said, "So shall my Word be that goeth forth out of My Mouth; it shall not return unto Me void, but it shall accomplish that which I please and it shall prosper in the things whereto I sent it."
