Young People's Column

THE CHRISTIAN RACE

In Hebrews 12-1 we find these words: "Wherefore seeing we are compassed about with so great a cloud of witnesses let us lay aside every weight and the sin which doth so easily beset us and let us run with patience the race that is set before us."

We believe the apostle Paul in writing to the Hebrews was writing to a body of professed Christians, a people who had been saved and were members of the Church of Christ.

At once we see he is comparing the Christian life to a race.

There are certain things required of us as individuals before we are eligible contestants for the race. The text says, let us lay aside every weight. There are weights which are not sins in themselves, but they become stumbling blocks in our Christian progress. One of these is despondency. The heavy heart is indeed a weight which will drag us down in our usefulness and service. The failure of Israel to enter the "Land of Promise" began in murmuring as the text in Numbers puts it, "As it were they murmured." Let us give no liberty to a discouragement or doubt as the enemy seems to use these as much or more than any other weight to drag us down.

Next he says: "Lay aside the sin." I believe Paul meant inbred sin, the principle of sin and we know if we are going to make progress along Christian lines we must have our hearts cleansed from the "inbeing of sin" and made pure, a fit temple for the indwelling Holy Ghost. After we have laid aside all the weights or have been saved from our actual transgressions and then have our hearts cleansed, and made pure it is then, and only then, we are in a place where we are able to run in the race. We can expect weights and cares from the enemy as before which he will try to use to hinder our progress but Paul says: run with patience.

Peter says: "Add to your faith patience and it is a very essential grace."

To run with patience is sometimes a difficult thing. We become so eager to reach the goal running is apt to suggest the absence of patience. The hard thing is that most of us are called to exercise our patience not out of work but in active service, in the work shop, in our social life and wherever we may be placed.

In I. Cor. 9-24 we read: So run that ye may obtain. It is a grand thought to know this race is not all running without a goal. The grit of one of the members in the Olympic games at Los Angeles recently calls for admiration on our part though he fell far behind; instead of dropping out he covered every foot of the distance at his best possible pace.

Let us as young people keep our eyes on the prize or goal and be faithful in the race and keep at our best for Christ.
