August 25, 1933.

Dear Homeland Friends:

I know it has been a very long time since we have written, but we have been very busy, so please forgive us.

We had a very nice meeting on the 20th. (Communion service). A good attendance and splendid attention. Five young girls gave themselves as seekers—we trust they may become true Christians. Three of them are daughters of Christian mothers—one is just a young bride and the other has a widowed mother who is also a seeker.

A young widow whom we have long been interested in gave herself as a seeker at a Sunday service here two weeks ago. We used to visit her when we first came to live at Altona. She was very unhappy with a second wife and when the husband suddenly died about two years ago she moved away to the Emozane section and has lately begun to attend services.

Aloni, who has been staying here for a week or two, went with me last Friday to chief Msih's kraal where we had a beautiful service. The chief was present and I never saw him as attentive and apparently touched as he was that day—we yearned over his poor darkened soul. Aloni related some of his early experiences—how he used to visit the chief's father's kraal and drink beer with them, following the ways of his own heart until conviction came to his soul by the hearing of the Word of God when he saw his lost condition and left his evil ways. He certainly did speak beautifully and said, "when they hear that Aloni is dead, he will be living with the Lord". His testimony greatly impressed the people.

Two weeks ago we had a crowded hut at a kraal about three miles from here—a widow had asked for a special meeting. The Lord gave liberty and blessing in speaking to those souls and a fine testimony meeting followed. We were loath to close the service but sunset time came and we had to leave.

Helen and Aloni had another good congregation at a heathen kraal on Klip Vaal last week. Many heathen present and good attention. I went to a heathen kraal next day not far from there to see a sick woman. She has consumption and fears death. We pray that she may be saved. She has several daughters and sons, as well as sister-wives and daughters-in-law and they intimated, as they showed a nice ronderel made by the eldest son, that it would be a fine place to come and hold a meeting in that rondorel if anyone would like to. This was really inviting us to come with Christians and have a public meeting with them like Helen and Aloni had at the other kraal. I promised we would do so.

Pray for us that the Spirit of the Lord may rest upon us very specially these days as we labor among these people.

We look forward to Beulah news eagerly and hope to receive letters soon from those who attended camp meeting.

You have of course heard of Mrs. MacDonald's illness. We are glad to say she is getting on nicely now. Helen came here with the children when she went to the hospital three weeks ago. They are well and very happy here.

Mr. MacDonald brought several of the workers from Hartland with him on Big Sunday, which helped much in the service. Jesina, from Hibberdene is a very impressive speaker. She was here last Big Sunday also and the people were all greatly touched by her testimony. She

has gone back to her home now and we look for Isaya back soon. He has been filling her place while she was away which has been almost three months now.

Now I must close and we hope to write soon again. With Christian love from us both to you all.
