U. S. BACKSLIDERS IN LONDON

The American delegates at the World Economic Conference, representing a wet administration, fresh in their recollection of the slogan, "We Want Beer," must have felt like backsliders when they saw Denmark and England oppose France's effort to get them behind a world slogan of wine and prosperity. Just as beer was going to help America back to prosperity, wine was going to help the world to economic recovery.

England did not debate it as an economic issue, but rejected it because of its unnecessary effront to Mohammedan people in Egypt, who opposed intoxicants, and the citizens of India who were for temperance. The delegate from Denmark said that they had temperance organizaions, entitled to consideration, who did not believe wine was good for the health. The American delegates flicked the ashes from their cigars and cigarettes and looked at their toes; while the French delegates, noting a lack of support from the "new deal" disciples, wondered what had become of America's penchant for drinking its way back to prosperity.
