THE PRAYING HEART

Dr. Len G. Broughton says: "The man who is living the life of victory is living the prayer life, because the Spirit is constantly forming in him prayers that are after the will of God, and while he may not be constantly dropping down on his knees, he is in that relation with the Holy Spirit where the prayer is formed in his desire, and as he goes about his business there is the prayer desire that goes out to God.
