"STOUT HEARTS MAKE THE SHIP SAFE"

It is well to keep in mind the saying of Jos. Conrad, "It is stout hearts that make the ship safe." There is no one free from anxiety today. They are hardly human if they are. But we must have care that fears and anxieties do not take control of the ship. And if there are any people in the world who should retain their poise and ride their fears rather than be ridden by them it is we who profess the name of Christ.

There is no lack of pessimistic forecasts. Harold E. Fey, writing on "Missions and Machines," in the International Review of Missions, presents a few of them. The leader of the prophets of doom is Oswald Spengler, whose theory is that history goes in cycles and that we have passed the peak of our cycle and are now falling swiftly into decadence. George Santayana says, "Civilization is perhaps approaching one of those dark winters that overtake it from time to time." Wells says, "Destruction is not threatening civilization; it is happening to civilization before our eyes. The ship of civilization is not going to sink in five years time, nor fifty years. It is sinking now." Ferrero, the great Italian historian, has declared that we are "travelling step by step, back toward paganism." And Count Keyserling has pointed out that "all over the world the awakening masses are either irreligious or anti-religious to an extent previously unknown in history."

One cannot brush opinions like these lightly aside. The men who speak them are men whose calling and opportunities give their judgment special weight. But the ship has not quite drifted on the rocks. And it won't if there are enough stout hearts to hold steady, to fearlessly lay hold on every measure that makes for a better world. We do not believe in inevitable and automatic progress, but we do believe that there are enough spiritual resources to sway the world and our civilization. These are the testing times of our faith, times that will show whether we will be swept along by the tide of panic fears or whether we belong to that elect company that meet all earth's turmoils unafraid because they know that-

"God is our refuge and strength,

A very present help in trouble.

Therefore will not we fear, though the earth be removed.

And though the mountains be carried into the midst of the sea;

Though the waters thereof roar and be troubled,

Though the mountains shake with the swelling thereof."
