An ox had been slain for a feast there. Helen and I went, but George had to return home. According to Zulu custom the bride took many presents to her husband's people, such as lovely grass mats and many articles made of grass which are useful in a native household. The "untimba" march around the ing these gifts. It is a very pretty part of a native wedding.

A service was held in an open space under a big tree and Isaya spoke beautifully from Eph. 5:21-28. He talked against heathen custom as only a Zulu can talk to Zulus and the Lord honored His Word. The message was most fitting indeed. There must have been 400 natives present on that day, and the Lord's hand was upon the service, for which we do praise Him. The new home is on Altona not far from the mission, so we still have Joana with us. She came to thank us for her wedding, saying "she needed months" to express her gratitude—a real Zulu way of thanking. The groom said, "we were married like a king," and his poor orphan heart was greatly touched and pleased. He attended meeting here Sunday—a very unusual thing for him.

And now I must close. I hope this lengthy account of a Zulu wedding will not be without some interest to our "white friends."

It was full of interest to us who live among these black people, and we do praise the Lord for the change the gospel brings to them.

We trust it will be a happy Christmas season to you all.

At present I am home to spend Christmas and New Year's with father and mother. God has been so good to allow us all to be home together once more, and we appreciate it very much indeed. In looking forward to Christmas, I longed to spend it home and believed God would supply the means if it were His will. He did wonderfully answer my prayer.

The longer I stay at Wood's Harbor the better I like the place and people. They have been more than kind to me and seem to appreciate having one to shepherd them. On Sunday the 18th, I received a Christmas present "from the friends at Wood's Harbor"—an envelope of money. May God bless them! They have been having a hard time so I certainly appreciate the gift and the spirit in which it was given. The evening service being my farewell one, was very well attended—around fifty or over, I guess. We hold all the services in homes now. Many of our converts greatly desire a building of our own in which to worship God and are eagerly looking

forward to an organization. Several of the men have quit using tobacco, since my return in October. Thank the Lord!

The two weekly prayer meetings are being continued during my absence and a prayer service on Sundays as well. The cottage meetings have been well attended and folk have several times requested that the "next one" be in their home, without any one asking permission. Twice we met in a young couple's home though neither one are saved. Both, I think were moved and my longing and prayer is that they will soon take their stand for Jesus.

Though I have not seen as great results as I would like to have, yet I do praise God for what is visible. Three backsliders were restored; one of whom has not been to a meeting since, having been strictly prohibited by her father. In fact she had to steal away to the last one in which she returned to God. So the Enemy is at work. She is but one of several who are persecuted by their parents. My heart was made to rejoice to see one of them take his stand, though very timid and bashful, and testify. He has not missed one since. It has been encouraging to note the spiritual growth of these "little lambs". May God give me the needed wisdom to lead them on with Him.

As it has been some time since I sent a report from this part of the field, I thought perhaps some were wondering how we were getting along. The Christmas season passed with the usual tree loaded with gifts, the exercises by the children and treat of candy, which was enjoyed by all. The pastor and wife were not forgotten by church and congregation, for which we thank them one and all for their kind expressions of appreciation of our efforts put forth in the work. The regular services are sustained, and the interest is good, and of late has been increasing. I still believe that what is needed in all our churches is patient holding on and continuing to put forth the best effort we can, and especially living each day as we profess while in the church. This is bound to bring results.

As some know during the past few months, a spirit of revival has swept over our little town, for which we are very thankful indeed. The good work started in one of the other churches, as special services were being held there. The interest spread and we soon began to see results in our services, as a number of our young men and women, also boys and girls, were converted. This took place in the regular week night and Sunday services. As a result of this good work we baptised thirteen who united with the church. These with nine others that had been baptised by Brother Dunlop, came into the church. These with one who came in by letter, makes a total of twenty-three to unite with the church since last Alliance.

This church although not much being said about it, has certainly established a good work here on this Island. They have in addition to the main church, a mission at Alley's Bay, about two miles from here. This was brought about by some members who felt that they were too far away to attend the services at the church, so they secured a building, remodeled it, making a neat and comfortable place for worship.

Sabbath School is held as well as other services on Sunday, also two prayer meetings each week, one especially for the young people. While we feel the loss of these members from the work here, financially and otherwise, yet we are glad for the good work being done at that end of the town. This is a very hard time along the coast, as many know, fish are very scarce, and prices the lowest ever known, and the outlook not very good for any improvement, yet we propose to carry on with the help of God and press the battle for Holiness.
