GOING ON.

There is no standing still if folk maintain their fellowship with God. The children of Israel must keep on the march through the wilderness country if they would reach Canaan, then there must be an aggressive campaign in order to occupy that land promised to them, they must go on until all the enemies were driven out. God had said, every foot of land that you place your feet upon shall be yours. There was no resting after they had crossed the Jordan river; there was hard fighting ahead. We have an example in Caleb of the spirit of conquest and victory. We sing many times, "Much land ahead to be possessed, I'm going on," that sounds fine in singing but is it actual experience?

Since last reporting from this part of the vineyard we have been engaged in two special campaigns. Brother H. S. Mullen gave you a report of the meeting at the H.


