## THE MISSIONARY CAUSE UNDER FIRE

Truth will always bear inspection. It welcomes the light. The cause of missions has never been subjected to more searching investigation than today. That which is foundational and fundamental in the missionary enterprise will come out unscathed no matter what the investigation may be. Jesus gave the great commission to disciple all nations. The early Church was afire to carry out that commission. Its greatest progress was made in those early centuries of its intense missionary activity. It continued through the eighteenth and nineteenth centuries. Today, however, the evangelical faith is being questioned. The challenge is being made to the gospel of Christ. We contend that there is "no other name given under heaven among men whereby we can be saved." The Christian religion can never rest peacefully beside any other religion that challenges the cross of Christ. The gauntlet has been thrown down and there will be no cessation of the battle until Jesus comes.

The missionary cause demands the highest surrender and unselfish service that is possible for a human being to give. It raises questions, "Is Christ the universal Saviour?" "Can society be redeemed alone through Him?" "Is the Bible the supreme Book?" "Is the Church of God the only instrumentality for bringing salvation to the nations of the earth?" These are vital questions. The answers to these questions measure the right or the wrong attitude as it relates to the gospel of Christ. With the child of God there is only one answer, the affirmative.

We are meeting today the challenge of a peculiar civilization. Moral standards are being unsettled and upturned. There is a growing irreligion everywhere and crime is on the increase. Never in the history of the Church was its members called upon to translate into living reality the principles of Jesus Christ. The preacher and the Church must be certain of one great issue—Jesus the Saviour of the world. The special laymen's committee that are investigating the missionary cause say that the old-fashioned evangelism is out of date. That contact with pagan nations cannot be made on that basis. That the blood of Christ as the only saving efficacy no longer appeals. To all of this the answer of the Church is, "There is one mediator between God and man, the man Christ Jesus."

The preacher is the missionary leader. He must fill his heart and soul with the needed information. There must be a missionary passion begotten of the Spirit of God and with these conditions prevailing his voice will have no uncertain note in setting forth why money given out of generous hearts is needed for the great commission of Christ. There are many adversaries, but with Paul we must say, "A great and effectual door is opened to us." Not by missionary plans but by the foolishness of preaching God intended to save men and women. In the homeland, and on the foreign field the broad subject of missions must be pressed for the Church that is not aflame with the missionary spirit is the church that is doomed to die.—*The Wesleyan Methodist*.
