EDITORIAL

TEACH US TO PRAY

A disciple said to Jesus at one time, teach us to pray, and He gave them that beautiful form of prayer that so many people repeat. Some of the petitions of this prayer, "Thy kingdom come. Thy will be done as in heaven, so on earth," strike one with particular emphasis. We feel to cry out of the depths of our nature, Lord teach us to pray. Then the question arises, pray for what? And an answer comes ringing in our ears, the salvation of men, for that is the way in which the kingdom comes. Jesus said, "the kingdom of God is within you. Paul writes to the Romans, "For the kingdom of God is not meat and drink; but righteousness, and peace, and joy in the Holy Ghost". We need to be consistent in our praying, for if we do not believe in the Holy Ghost, we certainly hinder our prayers.

We have been led to think of the many ways men are brought into the Kingdom of God. The power of prayer is tremendous. We hardly realize the great lever that has been put within our grasp, and with faith as the fulcrum, it is not any wonder that Jesus declares, "If ye ask anything in my name, I will do it." Here is our privilege and responsibility.

Let us pray for the different means, whereby men are brought in contact with the truth, that they be made effective in the salvation of their souls.

Our regular services in our churches should be pregnant with spiritual power. Men need to feel their need and become alarmed at their condition in sin, the need of the new birth, and also the baptism with the holy spirit. Now this usually takes place through the preaching of the word. Then we need to pray for the preacher, that he or she may lift up Jesus and the fullness of salvation that He purchased by His death on Calvary.

Our camp meetings should be places where Christians meet to pray and wait on God in a special way for the outpouring of His spirit upon the people in deep conviction. The crowds of unsaved folk who come to such a place are like the crowd that followed Jesus out into the desert place, without anything to eat. He had compassion on them, and with the aid of the disciples, gave them to eat.

Let us pray that our camp meetings, Beulah and Riverside, will be places where multitudes will be led to Christ and the folk who have not yet received the baptism with the Holy Ghost, may be led into this wonderful experience. Teach us to pray, that it will be so.
