## SELF DENIAL FUND

THE STATE OF THE GODLY

The godly are safe and secure "from the snare of the fowler, and the noisome pestilence." God's promises to the godly are sure. "Because thou hast made the Lord, which is my refuge, even the Most High, thy habitation: there shall no evil befall thee; neither shall any plague come nigh thy dwelling" (Psalm 91:9). Is God true to his promises?

Another gracious promise: "For the Lord God is a sun and a shield, the Lord God will give grace and glory, no good thing will he withhold from them that walk uprightly" (Psalm 84:11). Again, God has promised to do "exceeding abundantly above all that we ask or think." "Trust in the Lord and do good, and thou shalt dwell in the land, and verily thou shalt be fed." Is it true that God gives his angels, "which are ministering spirits, over his children, to keep them in all their ways?"

In great disasters, are the righteous preserved, or do they suffer with the ungodly? David says the "righteous are fruitful, and prosperous, but the ungodly are not so; they are like the chaff which the wind drives, and shall not stand in the judgment." God many times, and in various ways, preserved his faithful in great disasters, although often his people have suffered with the ungodly.

It must be remembered that all God's promises are conditional. If we fail to meet the conditions, we cannot expect to receive the promise. Take the promise that "God will give grace and glory, no good thing will be withheld from them that walk uprightly." Many are the thoughts of both the godly and the ungodly concerning the death of our esteemed Brother McLaughlin, in the earth quake at Long Beach. Do the angels of God encamp round about them that fear him, and delivereth them? How mysteriously strange Brother McLaughlin met his death! On the morning of the quake, March 10, he spoke at the chapel exercises, having taught five classes. After going home he read an English religious paper. He then went across the street to a store for a few articles. On his return from the store the quake came, and a falling brick hit him on the temple. If he had been one moment ahead or one moment behind he would have been safe. God did not change his law to preserve the life of his beloved, which he often has done, both in ancient and modern history. But such an incident touches our innermost heart, to see a brother, whose life of many years was spent in the service of Jehovah, absolutely devoted, consecrated and dedicated to the propagation of the pure and unadulterated Word of God, the holy gospel, cut off so suddenly and unexpectedly. After all, that morning's work for God, then for Brother McLaughlin and that brick to arrive at the same point at the same time, resulting in the death of a precious soul so suddenly.

But then we have many comforting promises. "Precious in the sight of the Lord is the death of his saints." And our brother was one and will have no trouble to find his place among the saints around the throne of God. And then again, we exclaim it is all mysterious, but it will all appear clear, "when the mists have rolled away, on the dawning of the morning."—Christian Witness.
