#### EDITORIAL

## ALLIANCE AND CAMP MEETING 1933

The 46th Alliance and the 40th Camp Meeting of the Reformed Baptist Alliance were held as usual at Beulah Camp Ground, the Alliance convening Wednesday morning, June 28th at 10.30 in the usual devotional service, at which a goodly number were present. Rev. F. A. Watson, the President, led the service, bringing a helpful and inspiring message from a part of the 15th chapter of Saint John's gospel.

The first business session was held in the afternoon at 2 o'clock, Rev. F. A. Watson was elected President for the second term and Rev. E. A. Dunlap became Vice-President. The other officers remain the same as last year with the exception that Mrs. Arthur Owens was elected Assistant Secretary.

There was a goodly number of delegates present and the business was carried forward with a beautiful spirit of harmony through all the sessions; many times there were songs of praise and shouts of joy interspersed.

The Camp Meeting began on Friday evening June 30th. Rev. Peter Wiseman, D. D., of Ottawa, the evangelist was on hand for this service, and his message revealed that the right man had been secured. On every side was heard expressions of appreciation and words of praise. Brother Wiseman kept to the main line all through the meeting, lifting up Jesus and the power of His blood for cure of sin. He was definite in preaching two works of grace, with the anointing on his soul. He carried a burden for souls continually and poured out his heart in earnest entreaty. There were a goodly number who professed to be helped throughout the meeting, and the influence of the meeting was far-reaching. We can safely say we have never had a better evangelist and teacher than Brother Wiseman. The attendance was good throughout the entire meeting, the weather was favorable for the most part, the last Sunday was a beautiful day and there was a large crowd. quartette sang beautifully and freely, one of their number is Lic. Harvey Blaney who is taking the pastorate at Royalton this fall. All certainly enjoyed their ministry in song.

The Annesley College Quartette was with us during the entire meeting. These boys have not been long together but they sang beautifully under the inspiration of the Holy Spirit and were a great blessing to the meeting. This quartette for the summer has been reorganized and will be a Reformed Baptist Male Quartette. We also had a ladies' quartette and much other special music was appreciated by all.

What a band of young people were present this year! Their numbers have increased in the last twelve months, so that there was a larger attendance than last year. It speaks well for the denomination in its future work on full salvation lines. A number of young men are preparing themselves for the ministry. There was a young people's convention held on Saturday afternoon, July 8th, an account of this will appear in the Young People's page in The King's Highway.

An ordination service was held on Sunday afternoon, July 9, when three Licentiates, namely Arthur Owens, Earnest Bradley and Howard Robertson were ordained to the gospel ministry. A large congregation was present and the Divine seal was upon it all.

The finances were good considering, and the attendance and interest was encouraging despite the world condition. We look hopefully toward the future. God is undertaking for us in the matter of spreading scriptural holiness over these lands; If we will continue faithful to our trust, victory is assured. Praise the Lord.

Three new churches have been organized during the year and many have been added to our churches through revival effort. To God be all the glory.

An efficient committee looked after the dining hall and the service rendered was satisfactory to the patrons. Over the last week-end all available space for sleeping was utilized.

One of the best public missionary meetings we have had in a number of years was held on Saturday evening, July 1st. The Auto Fund is being continued and we hope there will be a general response. Our missionaries are doing well and are being used of God for the extension of His Kingdom. The closing service was impressive, a goodly number of seekers were at the altar, then there were hymns sung, the young people gathered at the front and sang, "I'm Going Through" and Rev. F. A. Dunlap offered prayer in their behalf, then hands were joined by a company of over two hundred, reaching all the way around the inside of the tabernacle, and they united in singing "When the Roll is Called Up Yonder I'll Be There", after which the President, F. A. Watson, offered the closing prayer.

## RESOLUTION PASSED BY ALLIANCE

We, the Reformed Baptist Alliance in annual session at Beulah Camp, N. B., July 1st, 1933, hereby place ourselves on record as reaffirming our stand on the liquor question. That we are in full accord with the Southern Baptists of the U. S. A. in opposing the repeal of the 18th Amendment and bringing in the sale of 3.2 Beer and other intoxicants. We also wish to take our stand with the Evangelical Alliance of Saint John, N. B., as opposed to the sale of Beer and Wine in the hotels of the province.

Furthermore, we deplore the fact that our Government in inviting our neighbors across the border to visit us, places in their hands a Government Hand Book, entitled, "The Intoxicating Liquor Act. 1927, as administered by the N. B. Liquor Control Board."

We are pleased to note the position which the temperance people of the U. S. A. are taking in the defense of the 18th Amendment, and commend the good work of Rev. Frederick Smith, of Waterville, Me., in connection with this matter. We also highly commend the high standard set by the Province of P. E. I. in maintaining the prohibitory law. We further urge that a continuous educational campaign be carried on in all our churches, instilling into the minds of the children and young people the baneful results of tampering with intoxicating drinks in any form, as it tends to the breaking down and corrupting of morals.
