Then Belina, another helper, is shining for the Lord. She is being sorely tried by her next door neighbor, a man who is turning his cattle and donkeys into her garden at nights, until now everything is about finished. This is really a very hard thing to happen to a native woman, but she is holding on to the Lord. She is reporting this to Chief Bhekapi tomorrow, which is quite proper as they are both under his care or rule, and no doubt the man will get his punishment for such actions. The husband of this woman is away at the present time, working for tax money. Belina is a real good woman and not very strong.

Maponda, a single young man, he is far from good looking, but is white in heart. He is going on nicely in the Lord, but his home is a heathen kraal and his brothers are always making all sorts of disturbances fighting and drinking beer. His father died a short time ago and he firmly believes he was poisoned by his eldest brother. This is a great grief to him. He gave a good testimony and others as well testified well.

Our native Christmas was held on Monday, Dec. 26th. Brother MacDonald and others from Hartland came on Saturday to be here for Big Sunday.

We had a good day on Sunday and a baptismal service, a woman and a man both gave good testimonies of sins forgiven.

On Monday morning the people came with happy faces with their goats and to help in the work of the feast. Nineteen goats were given and twenty-eight hens, besides the usual amount of crushed corn. This made a lot of work but there were many willing hands, and we had an abundance of meat. It began to rain, but Isaya and others put up a covering over the pots, so the food was all cooked without any trouble, and at two o'clock the services began and lasted for two hours. The church was simply packed—four hundred and fifty people within and fifty outside. Brother MacDonald gave each one a box of matches as they came out of the church. This was very much appreciated by all.

The service was very nice—a very sweet spirit was felt and we trust the words will be remembered and bear fruit. We are sorry but the heathen were not as many as other years; as there were several beer drinks and meat at some of the different kraals, and of course they chose to go there.

As I have said before the people give to the Christmas feast as unto the Lord as thanks for blessings of the past year. It is very nice the Christmas spirit they have, therefore the day is always a blessing to all.

Tuesday morning the river having filled up by Monday's heavy rain, Brother MacDonald and Eliasi Sibuya had to return home by Commondale bridge, a distance of fifty-seven miles, the others from Hartland remaining until Thursday, when they were able to cross the river with help, the water having gone down some.

We all had a good time and enjoyed our Christmas visitors very much. We are having

a very hot summer so far, but we trust you are having a good winter season.

The kind friends at Grey's Mills sent us as usual their annual Christmas gift of money. This we appreciate very much indeed, and trust the Lord will bless them much.

Trusting this New Year will be a good year for you all, and I ask your prayers for us.
