EDITORIAL

WHAT SAY THE SCRIPTURES?

All Scripture is given by inspiration of God, and is profitable for doctrine, for reproof, for correction, for instruction in righteousness: That the man of God may be perfect, thoroughly furnished unto all good works. 2 Tim. 3-16:17. There have been certain sects of religious people who have been accused of placing too much emphasis upon the experience of entire sanctification, as a work of grace subsequent to the experience of justification.

We notice, however, that the folk who stress second blessing holiness are the people who stress Repentance, the New Birth, Regeneration, the Witness of the Spirit, the Resurrection of the Dead and Eternal Judgment.

There seems to be a grave misunderstanding on the part of many, in reference to Bible teaching in regard to this most wonderful blessing and experience. So many seem to think that it is an emotional affair, that to obtain it one has to be in a condition of hysteria or something of the sort. There is no doubt in our mind that the enemy has a counterfeit to offer for the real thing; and many folk who would accept a substitute, will get it, because they are not willing to yield themselves completely to God for the purpose of being wholly sanctified. To obtain this most estimable blessing, one must needs get alone with God, even if they are with others at an altar of prayer, where God can deal personally with them, to uncover and discover to them the vileness of their heart, and carnality with its hatred and antagonism to the law of God. If any one is at a time of keen calculation, it is when the Spirit of God is taking them over the death route, when they are dying out to everything, until they are stripped of everything earthly, and there is a willingness that God will and shall be all and in all, when that soul completely abandons itself to God, until the will is completely swallowed up in God's, now and forever. Ours is the consecrating, it is the baptism of the Holy Spirit that does the purifying, "for He is like a refiner's fire and like fullers' soap; and he shall sit as a refiner and purifier of silver; and he shall purify the sons of Levi; and purge them as gold and silver, that they may offer unto the Lord an offering in righteousness.

God's mind for His people is that they shall be perfect, thoroughly furnished unto all good works, and to make this possible Jesus gave himself for the church, that he might sanctify and cleanse it—that he might present it to

himself a glorious church—that it should be holy and without blemish. God calls his people to holiness, through sanctification of the Spirit. This experience is not for sinners but for believers and in consequence, is a second work of grace. As justification has to do with the sinner, so transgression has to do with the believer. As forgiveness of actual transgressions has been provided for the sinner, so cleansing from all unrighteousness has been provided for the believer. Praise the Lord. We have the word of God for it. let us stick to it, experience it, live it, teach it, to the glory of God and the benefit of humanity. We are on God's line, let us stick to it. Thank God it works. The land is before us, let us rise up and go forth to conquest and victory, in the name of our God.

We wish at this time to give a report of the special meetings held here, which closed Monday night, Feb. 20th.
