Just a little note for the benefit of those that are interested in the work at Westchester.

As the pastor I feel mighty good over the accomplishments, as the work done seems to be a real work. Many that found God covered their back tracks, making restitution, restoration, apologies, etc., which to my mind are real revival tracks. This kind of work brought on the blessing of God, and marching and praising God found quite a large place in the meetings.

The increasing interest seemed to call for more services, but prevailing conditions called for a halt. I honestly think if we could have obtained help at the last there would have been a real sweep for God and Holiness. We are still praying and believing for greater results yet.

Since coming here there has been a deepening spiritually in the church. Our Sunday School has greatly increased in number and interest.

In closing we would not forget the help that one and all rendered for the success of the meetings. The special singer, fasting and praying by young and old, brought their share of results.

We thank God for the victories won, the glory given and the promises yet to claim and be fulfilled.
