It seems to me that one of the gravest dangers which menace the youth of this generation is aimlessness. This is so in the realm of temporal things; the lack of opportunity along many lines, the scarcity of useful em-

ployment, closed doors here and thwarted ambitions there, all have a tendency to cause the youth of our day to settle into a condition of hopelessness for their future, and aimlessness regarding their life work.

While this is serious enough it is more serious when we consider spiritual matters. And yet the fact remains that many folk both old and young have gotten into a sort of tread-mill. They are travelling but getting nowhere; working but accomplishing nothing, and all because they have no fixed holy purpose in life.

I like the spirit of the boy of whom I read the other day. He had gone to his father and said, "Dad, I want something to do." His father set him to piling wood from one end of the shed to the other. Having finished the task the lad returned to his father for another. His father, in a rather preoccupied mood, said, "Oh, on second thought, I guess you better pile it back where it was before." The lad's answer was: "Not on your life; I want something useful to do." I like that spirit.

There are three characters spoken of in God's word who manifested this spirit of holy purpose. There was Daniel. We remember what a remarkable man he was, how he stood the tests which came to him, and how God exalted him to a high position. Why was it? The record of his life reveals the secret; he was a man of purpose (Dan. 1-8). "He purposed in his heart."
