# PREDICTIONS OF ANTI REPEALISTS ARE REALITY NOW.

The results of repeal have fulfilled every promise its opponents made for it. The records prove it. Its friends admit it.

Repeal has brought back the public drunk. Arrests for drunkenness during the first three months of 1934, after repeal, as compared with the same months of 1933, dry, increased sharply over the entire nation. Typical cities are New York, 55.5%, and Los Angeles, 95.5% increase, while Denver and some other cities more than doubled. Boston reports an increase of 75% in drunkenness among women.

Repeal has brought back the saloon. Figures of the U. S. Department of Justice show that prohibition closed 177,000 saloons. The Internal Revenue Department reports show that on June 30, 1934, there were over 700,-000 four times the number in pre-prohibition days.

Repeal has increased auto fatalities. The Chicago Tribune editorially deplored the fact that auto fatalities charegable to drunken driving had increased four-fold in that city since repeal. The Automobile Chamber of Commerce figures show that with car registrations and gas consumption down in 1933, as compared with 1932, traffic deaths are up. The U. S. Census confirms with a report showing an increase of 1.2 deaths per 100,000 population.

Repeal has greatly increased bootlegging. Director Choate of the Federal Alcohol Control Administration emphatically says so, and Secretary of the Treasury Morgenthau supports the claim.

Repeal debauches and ruins young girls. Dr. Alice Aldrich, Chicago welfare superintendent, says: "Chicago present-day saloons are causing delinquency among young girls to an extent never equalled even in the old days. Young people of opposote sexes drink openly until they are no longer responsible for their acts. . The saloons, with the back room and upstairs facilities, constitute an alarming cause of immorality." Similar reports come from every quarter of the Union. Repeal has fully lived up to every promise its opponents made for it.—National Voice in Pentecostal Herald.

## RELIGION IN TROUBLED WATERS

Speaking in the Marble Collegiate Church of New York recently, Rev. Dr. Albert W. Beaven said: "Russia, the world's greatest example of the war on religion, is out to kill the very concepts on which religion was based. It has operated on this diabolical principle—in religion, ki'i all the leaders. With Russian religious leaders either in Siberia, concentration camps or starving to death, the anti-religianists have free play with leaderless congregations." After citing the growing opposition to religious activities in Mexico and in Spain, Dr. Beaven continued:

"We are on the verge of some dynamic movements which we cannot foretell. Tomorrow is going to be an experimental, interesting and important stage in religion. Everybody in Europe is moving fast but fails to know where he is going. America, too, is guilty of swift indirection. Wherever one turns there are undercurrents which appear ready to destroy the true Church unless we take heed."

This is an interesting observation by a man who is not considered an alarmist; a confession that all is not well with the twentieth century religion that is so popular. Russia had the dead and kypocritical formality of the Eastern Catholic Church, and when Russia broke away from that the nation settled down into a horrible state of unbelief and angry opposition to all religion, except the religion of diabolism. Mexico, also, and Spain, after centuries of suffering at the hands of the selfishness and dead formality of the Papal Church now swings to the extreme of discounting all religion, which is readily explainable in the light of one extreme following another In America, if we may undertake to appraise our religious state in a brief description we would say the religious life of our country is settling into two great sections-the autocracies of American Catholicism and an apostate Protestantism building itself on the foundation of Modernism, with small bodies here and there protesting and maintaining spiritual life and devoton. If people are willing to wait on God and will bow to His authority He is pleased to work in a great variety of the church forms, but this central fact of a true spiritual experience and a holy life God must have from us, and always demands. Unwilling to meet this costly but reasonable requirement we have the fact in history of churches bearing the name Christian which for centuries have gone their way with no saving power. There is now all the more reason why churches that cherish spirituality should "be watchful and strengthen the things that remain." ---Wesleyan Methodist.
