FATAL ACCIDENT

George Cox, eldest son of Mr. and Mrs. Howard Cox of Rosedale about three miles from Woodstock, died on Thursday in the Fisher Hospital a few hours after undergoing an operation. He was 23 years old.

The young man was engaged on Wednesday afternoon in pruning an apple tree and cut his thumb with the saw he was using. He fainted and fell to the ground and a doctor was called. It was not thought he had received any injuries and the doctor ordered him to bed for the rest of the day. During the night he became very ill and Thursday was taken to the hospital in Woodstock and an operation performed for a ruptured spleen. He came through the operation but passed away during the afternoon.

Deceased was one of the best known young men in Carleton County and his tragic death will be learned of with sincere regret. He was the eldest son of Mr. and Mrs. Howard Cox and besides his parents is survived by a brother and sister.

The largely attended funeral was from their home in Rosedale at 2:00 p. m. on Saturday. The service opened with "Jesus Knows and He Cares" sung by Mr. and Mrs. A. J. Owens and Howard Adams. The scripture, 1 Corinthians 15:45-48 was read by Rev. H. Robertson followed by prayer by Rev. H. S. Dow. Mrs. Owens then sang, "He's the One." Following, Mr. Owens spoke truly comforting words, using as text, "O death where is thy sting?". A duet, "Safe in the Arms of Jesus" was then beautifully rendered by Rev. Hollis Kimball pronounced the benediction.

Interment was at Victoria Corner Cemetery.

Mr. Cox will be missed not only by his parents, a sister Ada, a brother Clarence, at home; and relatives, but by a large circle of friends. He was surely an example that any young person might aspire.
