## EDITORIAL

GOD'S ESTIMATE OF SPIRITUAL LIFE
"A living dog is better than a dead lion."—
Eccl. 9-4.

Perhaps the above saying by the wise man, is the most commendable thing that the Bible has to say about a dog. Almost without exception the name is used in scripture as a term of reproach. The dog was declared by the law of Moses to be an unclean animal, and was much despised by the Jews, God's ancient people. The most offensive expression they could use was to compare a man to a dog. Isaiah called the false prophets "dumb dogs that cannot bark." Greedy dogs that can never have enough. Paul called false apostles "dogs," and also Peter compares unclean wicked men who continually relapse into their sins, to dogs returning to their vomit. But Lion is spoken of in scripture as the most courageous and generous of all wild beasts. An emblem of strength and valour: To which is compared our Lord Jesus the great and mighty invincible Lion of the tribe of Juda, who conquers, and leads captive all of his, and his people's enemies.—Rev. 5-5. Yet in Solomon's comparison of a dog and lion: He declares that a dog is better. when the dog is living, and the lion is dead. He made this comparison and statement no doubt because he wanted to emphasize the importance of life. Jesus and the apostles called men who were saved, living men, and likewise those who were unsaved dead.

A few scripture references will prove this fact. John 10-10: "I am come that they might have life." John 6-53:- "Except ye eat the flesh of the Son of man and drink his blood ye have no life in you." She that liveth in pleasure is dead while she liveth. Again Paul said: "You hath He quickened (saved) who were dead in trespasses and sins. Eph. 2-1. John wrote, In Him was life, and the life was the light of men. When Solomon wrote the above proverb he might have been thinking of his own experience. Thinking of the time when he enjoyed the blessing of God, and reigned over God's people as a mighty prince, and like the Lion of the tribe of Juda conquered all his foes, and all his enemies feared him. In those days he was surely a living lion. But the divine record says that Solomon disobeyed God, and married many heathen women, and God was angry with him, so that

he like a dead lion became powerless in the hands of those heathen wives, who made him build high places and altars to their gods and bow down and worship them. A great rich king surrounded by wealth and worldly splendor, but with no power or life to resist evil or do right, wholly in the hands of the enemies of God "A dead lion." Solomon isn't the only man who forfeited God's blessing we fear. We read also of Saul, Israel's first king, that he was chosen of God, anointed by Samuel, and the Holy Ghost came mightily upon him, and he was a strong, brave and successful ruler. But he like Solomon disobeyed God and lost his support, and died a poor suicide on Mount Gilboa while fleeing from his enemies—"A dead lion." There have been many men, and churches, and societies, which enjoyed the presence of the Holy Spirit, and were strong for God and the cause of righteousness, but who through disobedience lost God's blessing and the Holy Spirit, which is to our souls what animal life is to the lion. No matter how big or well educated men are or how large churches are numerically, or how well equipped in other ways, without the indwelling presence of the Holy Spirit they are all dead lions. Sometimes these big institutions like the Jews of old, who had lost the approval of God, and called gentile converts dogs, look with disdain upon smaller churches or societies because they are small, and are continually barking at the sins of society and worldliness in so many so called churches. And they are always boasting of their large congregations and church edifices and equipment, and they call your attention to the size of their lion and how docile he is. His thundering voice is no more heard, in fact he never even growls at anything, no matter what wicked men do, or what his devotees or admirers do, and no one is afraid of him hurting their feelings, and everybody loves him. Well, no marvel at this. He is dead. Now the only way that these little socalled dogs or societies can be of any use at all or justify their existence is to be sure to keep alive, and to keep on barking at evil doers and their sins, because there is no use or room at all in the world for a dead dog. For there are enough dead lions around to supply all the needs that men have for dead
