## Article II.

The world is still staggering and reeling from the impact of the blow wielded upon her by the war of 1914-18.

The financial cost was tremendous; the loss of lives appalling. WAR COSTS!

The last war cost United States alone the sum of \$51,000,000,000 to date. No further back than 1885 this sum would have purchased the U. S. with everything and everybody in it. Today it would buy the whole state of New York including the great metropolis. The interest on this sum of money at the rate of 5% would support 2,125,000 people and would virtually abolish poverty from the United States. If someone could have started to throw away one dollar bills the day Christ was born and had continued until the present time at the rate of a dollar a minute they would still have 95,000 years to continue, to dispose of this sum. According to Calvin Coolidge the last war will cost the American Union nearly twice this sum before all is paid. If this one country, that did not enter the war until 1917 spent such a sum, what would the enormous sum spent by all the nations total?

Today sixty nations who in the League of Nations are pledged against war are spending \$1,000,000,000 annually to defend themselves.

What a tremendous amount of money to spend to prepare civilized people to become uncivilized!

France lost 5,623,000 men in the last war, 3,000,000 of Great Britain's sons paid the supreme sacrifice; while the United States had 360,000 killed and wounded.

Considering these facts is it surprising that people are demanding peace?

Reason tells us war is inhuman. Conscience tells us it is unChristlike.

Many times during the last year I have been confronted with the question, "Can Christians go to war?" I bring the question to you. Can you go to war in this enlightened age? In this dispensation of God's great mercy? This is a question that we must answer.

Perhaps some will say 'twill be ample time to answer this question if a war begins, but I believe this to be a mistaken idea.

Multitudes are swept off their feet in war times by the eloquent speeches and flowery words of "loyal" politicians who usually know nothing of the terrors of war except that which they read in the newspapers. Reason and love are dethroned and are replaced by an impulsive spirit of loyalty to home and country and thousands go to bloody battlefields with the sincere and single intention of protecting the people and country they love, while facing them as the hated enemy, are men just as humane and fully as loyal and loving as they. A spark of impulse, an awakened spirit of patriotism, fanned to a flame of deadly hatred by the oratorical, yet pretentious loyalists, and ridiculous stories of the extreme cruelty of the enemy; human beings spurred on to a state of bitter variance by selfish, cruel-hearted men, who under the guise of national loyalty and home protection, lay upon the shoulders of others burdens too heavy to bear while they themselves will not touch them with one of their fingers. Were the space allowed, proof could be brought of the preposterous falsehood of the gruelling accounts of the inhuman cruelty of the enemy that the newspapers print in war times; propaganda published for the express purpose of kindling and stoking the fires of hatred in the hearts of the people.

According to recent statement broadcast by the Federal Council of Churches, for each dollar spent for relief in 1929, two were needed in 1930, four in 1931, and eight in 1932. This ratio of increase cannot continue, but the first three months of the present year indicate that the actual increase in dollars for relief over 1932 will be greater than the increase of 1932 over 1931. This means that from twelve to thirteen times as much will be necessary to feed the hungry during the present year as was spent in 1929.—Religious Telescope.
