EDITORIAL

TAKING HEED

When the Apostle Paul wrote his first letter to the church at Corinth, he did so in part with a view to correcting some wrong notions which the members had, and to warning them of the danger involved. Some of them were very zealous in giving Paul all the credit for their conversion; others had Apollos as their favorite; some of them championed Peter; while a few gave God the glory and were true followers of Jesus Christ. Paul tells them that neither he nor Apollos nor Peter are anything except as they were used of God. He said, "I have planted, Apollos watered; but God gave the increase," and "He that glorieth, let him glory in the Lord."

First of all, Paul exhorts them to build upon the one great foundation, Jesus Christ. No other foundation will do. "For other foundation can no man lay than that is laid, which is Jesus Christ. Then he warns them against building a structure from poor materials, or in other words, against building a Christian character out of religious wood, hay, and stubble. The only character that shall endure time and enjoy eternity is the one that is built of the gold, silver, and precious stones of God's revealed truth. His warning was jointly to the church and to those teachers who should follow him, "But let every man take heed how he buildeth thereupon."

Most of our young people live in homes where the foundation truths of the gospel have been taught since our infancy. We have at least had the privilege of Church and Sunday School, and at various times have attended special meetings, a Quarterly or Convention, or perhaps Beulah Camp. At such times great men of God have preached to us again the true foundation, and have opened up great mines of truth from God's word. It remains with us whether we shall build upon that foundation or not, and whether we build our Christian character from the wood, hay and stubble on the surface, or dig deep for the gold, silver and precious stones. They alone shall endure, "For every man's work shall be made manifest." So let us take heed how we build thereupon.
