PURITY

Jesus says, "Thou shalt not think adultery" He emphasises what has become plain to the psychologists, namely, that ideas are motor; that if vou hold them within the mind by their very presence there they will pass straight into act. If you hold them in the mind long enough, they will brush past your will and become action in spite of all your protests. The statement many times repeated cannot be repeated too often: Sow a thought and you reap an act, sow an act and you reap a habit, sow a habit and you reap a character, sow a character and you reap a destiny. Note that the thought has to be sown, it will bring forth no act if it is dismissed at once. The sin is not in the coming of the thought, it is in the holding of it, the harboring of it. Thoughts of sin become sinful thoughts only when they are held and harbored. "You cannot help the birds flying over your heads, but you can help them building nests in your hair." You cannot help the vagrant thoughts flying through your mind, but you can help brooding over them, warming them, and thus hatching them into action. "I look only at the best pictures," said the great painter Sir John Joshua Reynolds, "for the bad ones spoil my eyes."

Herein is the difference between Jesus and modern thought; he was decisive in the matter of trifling with sex; modern thought is loose. Many have swung from Puritanism to impuritanism. But the future of the race belongs to the continent. Any race or group can rule that will subordinate a present desire for a larger goal. Any person who can say "No" on one level, in order to be able to say "Yes" on a higher level, emerges as a superior type. For sex cravings can be sublimated into higher forms of creative art, of poetry, of altruism, of service. Subordination in order to sublimation should be the Christian attitude.—E.
