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EDITORIAL

KINDNESS

"For He is kind unto the unthankful and to the evil." Luke 6:35.

The above words are from the teachings of our Lord in what is commonly called the "sermon on the mount". In his teaching there, he has been telling his disciples to do some things which are very difficult to do. In fact they are impossible for any one to do without the grace of God. Take for instance verses 27 and 28, "Love your enemies, do good to them which hate you. Bless them that curse you, and pray for them which despitefully use you." Who can do those things, before God has done something for him? There is enough in the above words in the teachings of Jesus, to convince any man, who will be convinced, of his need of a clean heart. The apostle Paul writes. "The carnal mind is enmity against God: for it is not subject to the law of God neither indeed can be". Rom. 8. Hence, until that evil principle has been cleansed away by the sanctifying power of the Holy Spirit men will find it almost, if not quite impossible, to "Love their enemies and to bless those who curse them. But Jesus commands us to do these things, and he expects us to do so. And the reason that he gives for these commands is found in our text, viz, "God is kind to the unthankful and to the evil." So if we profess to be his children, there ought to be a strong family resemblance to our father in our lives. I think that one of the most beautiful graces of the christian life, or of any person's life, is kindness. It is true that it is much easier for some folk to be kind than it is for others. Some are blessed by being born with a kindly disposition, and find it easy to forgive others and to be kind to them. And those persons cannot understand how hard it is for some others who are born with an unforgiving disposition and with a strong aversion to kindness, to forgive their enemies and to be kind to them. But God will sanctify the heart and give grace to all, to be kind to others even to our enemies as our Lord commanded. It does not require any grace to be kind to those who are kind to us Just human nature alone will do that. But the proof of grace is, that we are kind to the unthankful and the evil, and that we love our enemies. I believe that kindness will help to win men to God when nothing else will. And the man that is down is the one who needs our help above all men. It is a very mean, unchristian-like disposition that jumps on a man when he is down and refuses to let him get up, or to let others

help him up. It does not take much of a man to hold another down, after the enemy has defeated him. But it does take a real man with a heart of kindness, and christian love, to lift a fallen brother up again. There are far too many priests and Levites, who go and look at the man who fell among thieves, and they uncover his wounds again, and go on their way and tell others about what they saw and heard, but do nothing to help the wounded man. And there are altogether too few Samaritans who have compassion on the atflicted and are trying to help them to get on their feet again. I have been sorry about a great many things that I have done in the past. But I have never been sorry for being kind, to anyone. I have been sorry many times because I have not been more kind to the unthankful and the evil. We don't have to justify men in wrong doing, we can go to them and reprove them, but do it in a kindly spirit, as the word commands. "Restore such an one in the spirit of meekness, considering thyself lest thou also be tempted.' Gal. 6:1. But let us refrain from unkind back-biting which never helps anyone, not even the one who does it.

"Down in the human heart crushed by the tempter feelings lie buried that grace can restore, touched by a loving heart, wakened by kindness, chords that were broken will vibrate once more."
