Dear Highway:

We just closed six weeks of tent meetings here at Debec. One was baptized yesterday and ten last Sunday. The closing day was a great day as was a week ago. Large crowds attended the three services. I was alone during the last week, had three services and a baptism each Sunday and five during the week, and had to lead all the singing and do all the preaching. So today I feel old. Eighteen raised their hands last evening that they had been saved during the last six weeks. While some of course who had made a start during the week were not there. Scores raised their hands saying they had been helped and blessed.

Many who have been saved and helped and who enjoy the atmosphere of such services have engaged the large hall here for me to hold regular services in. Expect I shall give them the last Sunday night in the month and the second Sunday morning. Besides they want a mid-week service on Tuesday night. If many who are not quite ready to be baptized yet go through as they declare they intend to, we will be having another baptism here again before long.

Brother Robertson and the quartette from his church were here to assist yesterday. That is Brother Robertson was here during the afternoon service and the quartette sang for us both in the afternoon and evening.

I hope to be able to care for this work from where I live and without my car running I do not know how I can manage. I have not been able on the circuit I am on to buy tags this season. If some of God's people who are interested in new work would help to tag my old bus I might be able to carry on now and build this work up. The prospects look bright! Even brighter than the Killam's Mills work did!

I am praying and trusting the Lord to work things out the way He sees best. Join us in prayer for this needy place.

QUARTERLY MEETING

The Quarterly Meeting of District No. 2 convened with the church at Westchester Sept. 6th to 9th inclusive.

Mullen gave a very encouraging report of the work on the Millstream circuit, stating that a new parsonage was well on the way to completion.

A vote of thanks was tendered the Westchester Church for entertaining the quarterly, also an invitation from the Moncton Church for the next quarterly was accepted on motion.

Meeting adjourned, prayer being offered by Rev. H. S. Dow.

Saturday night Rev. H. S. Dow was the preacher, taking for his text Psalm 119:32. We were not privileged to be at this service but heard that Brother Dow was at his best.

The "Love Feast" Sunday morning was led by Brother Noah Hicks. A good time of prayer, praise and testimony was enjoyed by the saints. At eleven o'clock Rev. H. E. Mullen brought a fine message from 1st Peter 5:8. "Be sober, be vigilant." A timely message for these last days. This service was followed by a baptismal service when Rev. H. S. Mullen baptised a young brother in the stream.

At 2.30 p. m. Rev. H. S. Mullen preached in his characteristic and forceful way a sermon based upon the first chapter of 2nd Peter, showing the Christian life in a constant life of growth and additions. In the evening and closing service Rev. H. S. Dow gave us a message on "Love," taking for his text 1st Tim. 1-5. "The end of the commandment is Love out of a pure heart." At the close of this service three were at the altar to be reclaimed after which a good old fashioned testimony meeting was enjoyed.

Good crowds were in attendance, testifying to the fact that people are still interested in Holiness and members of the Westchester Church testified to having received a great spiritual uplift and were encouraged to still press the battle for God and Holiness in that place. One member was received into church membership in the evening service.
