ATTENTION, PLEASE!

There is a matter of considerable importance that I, as Treasurer and on behalf of the Mission Board, wish to bring to the attention of the lovers of the holiness cause who are anxious to see it spread in the home land as well as foreign. We have pressing foreign needs but our appeal is now for the home work, for to do a good foreign work we must keep our base-home missions flourishing, and branch out continually. You have noticed an item in the last issue of the "HIGHWAY" referring to the purchase of a church building at Lubec, Maine. The prospect of a good work there and vicinity seems promising, and a church building, a good one, can be purchased cheaply—for \$1200.00, if secured immediately (by April or May). We have already \$300.00 promised toward it, and one brother interested in extension work, has promised to be one with eight others to donate \$100.00 each to buy the building. Thus \$400.00, or one-third of the price, is promised, providing enough more is contributed to make up the price. We are not better situated than many others, but if sufficient funds are pledged and paid, we, wife and I, will give \$25.00. We will raise this by note if need be, for the work is urgent, and trust the Lord to help us through. Faith without works is dead so let us pray over the matter and ask our Great Head of the Church, and Supplier of All Needs, what He would have us to do in the matter. Some more will feel able and glad to contribute \$100.00 each, while others will give \$50.00 and \$25.00 each, so let us hear from you immediately. In keeping with our Sunday School lessons of late, let us lay up some treasures above NOW while we have an opportunity. God is more interested in what we GIVE than in what we LEAVE. To leave money for the Gospel work is good, and more ought to do it than are, but to GIVE it is far better. I want and expect to have some part in this work. How many others do?
