NOTICE

Dear Friends:

It is my intention to place before you at this time some facts and suggestions relative to our foreign missionary work. First I wish, on behalf of the Mission Board, to sincerely express our appreciation of the kindly consideration of the financial needs as has been done by many. Some have given generously and no doubt many have sacrificed greatly. To one and all we say, thank you. But notwithstanding all that has been done for the support of the regular work in Africa, we have been forced to borrow quite largely to keep the meagre salaries paid to date, for they must be paid. The larger amounts have been contributed for the passage expenses of the return of the Sanders family to Africa. This problem is one to be considered well. Shall we send them, and can we support them if we do send them? At present we are not raising enough money to support those who are already there, and shall we attempt a still greater burden? The missionary society has no funds other than is contributed by the various societies and friends from time

The call from Africa is for the return of the Sanders family. Personally, I am in full accord with the idea of sending them back, if available funds are assured. If the missionary family is returned to Africa, the Sterritt Sisters, who have been there over-long already, must be brought home. Some of our societies have been unable to contribute much during the year, and others have given theirs to the Passage Fund, which has probably been a mistake, as we need it so much for the regular expenses. In short, if we cannot keep our missionaries who are already in Africa, and beside this raise sufficient funds to finance the undertaking of the return of the Sanders family, and support it after it is there, it is folly to consider it.

It may seem that if the Sterritt Sisters are brought home, that the amount of their support could be turned toward that of the Sanders family; but it must be remembered that the expenses of the Sterrit's furlough would further increase the financial obligations.

To return what we have borrowed from other funds, and meet our further obligations until Alliance, we will need at least \$1300.00. You will ask, "Can we raise this amount and enough more to send the Sanders family, and bring the Sterritt Sisters home, all in so short a time?" Who will answer this, and how shall we do it? I would say that, if ALL will do ALL they can, and if several more will do as Brother W. R. Carson and Sister Small, who gave \$1000, and \$500, respectively, we then shall be able to accomplish this, so necessary undertaking, in our foreign missionary work. There are doubtless others of our denomination and friends, who could give like sums, and who, possibly have no one in particular to whom they should leave their life's savings rather than placing it in the work of the Lord in foreign missions.

I have been considering the idea of a "Special Easter Offering" for the particular purpose of "putting across" this very important feature of our foreign work. Shall we unitedly pray for the guidance of the Lord in this matter? Then as we come to Good Friday, on which day we commemorate the greatest sacrifice of One who loved fallen humanity, even darkest Africa, please make to our mission board, that gift, for the foreign missionary work, which would fully answer that long held conviction that you ought to do something worthwhile along this line.

Friends, this is doubtless our next largest

undertaking, and as you have always appreciated the frankness with which we have brought the needs before you, and as you have always responded so readily in times of other calls for assistance, we feel that you will again now make this appeal a special matter of prayer, and seek to answer the call again, as best it is possible.

Let us not merely read these lines, but immediately seek to make plans to contribute. Let us know what you will do in this matter. The Mission Board will greatly appreciate letters regarding what you are able to do, and what you may think is the most satisfactory way to raise these funds. The Board wishes to have this matter arranged by the time of our Alliance, so as to then complete arrangements if possible, for the return of the Sanders family to Africa and recall those in need of furlough.

May the Lord bless every one of the Highway readers, and help us all to do His highest will, is our prayer.
